ENGLISH ANCESTRY

1. EDMUND HEARD of Claxton, County Norfolk, England, the first known ancestor of the Heard family, died in 1626. His wife, whose name is unknown, predeceased him.

Edmund Heard was a linen weaver and held property both in Claxton and the nearby parishes of Hollington, Rockland and Ashby. His will, which was dated 20 Nov. 1626 and proved 4 Dec. 1626, requested that he be buried in the Claxton churchyard near his wife. He mentioned "Sister Agnes Bussy," widow; and appointed John Hunn of Claxton, yeoman, and Christopher Tollis of Neatshead, yeoman, to be executors. To his eldest son, Luke "Herd," he left £60, to be paid when he reached the age of twenty-one, plus the "best loom in my shop, six pieces of pewter, a spit, a brass posnet and my little table in the parlor, or six and fifty shillings in money for said loom &c." His sons Henry and Edmund were bequeathed £30 apiece when they reached twenty-one; and the daughters Grace and Katherine were each left £20 (Henry F. Waters, *Genealogical Gleanings in England* [Boston, 1901]).

Beyond mention in their father's will, nothing is known of the other children of Edmund Heard of Claxton. However, there are two letters in the Heard Collection (Baker Library, Harvard University Graduate School of Business Administration, Boston, Mass.), which present an interesting possibility. On 22 Jan. 1886 "S. Meredith" of 143 Clapham Road, London, wrote to George W. Heard of Brookline, Mass., explaining that an Edmund Heard of Norfolk, England, had died intestate in 1780. A George Heard of Norfolk failed to give evidence on his claim to the estate, and since no other claimant had made a good claim, the estate lay in the Courts of Chancery. There is also a reference to an Edward Heard of Cork, Ireland, in the letter. A second letter, undated, from Mrs. Susanna Meredith at the same address was sent to George W. Heard's daughter Fanny. It stated that "We Irish Heards are the descendants of two brothers who had a third, an elder brother, supposed to have gone to America at the date referred to and the Courts have decided that the Irish Heards cannot inherit this money because there may be descendants of the elder brother to be found." The amount of money involved in this case was £80,000 sterling.

In the nineteenth century, there were many spurious claims to cases in Chancery were raised to get Americans to invest in "proving" their rights to English estates. This may have been one such fraud, or there may be some element of truth in the story which has not yet been discovered.

FIRST GENERATION IN AMERICA

2. LUKE¹ HEARD, son of Edmund Heard, was born in England, probably between 1605 and 1608 (as he was not 21 in 1626). He died at Ipswich, Mass., shortly before 28 Sept. 1647, when his will was proved. He married SARAH RIDDLESDALE, who was baptized at Assington, Suffolk, England, 16 Nov. 1623, and died at Boxford, Mass., 3 June 1704, daughter of Edward and Mary (---) Riddlesdale; she was the step-daughter of John Wyatt of Assington, Suffolk, and Ipswich, Mass. (John Brooks Threlfall, "John Wyatt of Ipswich, Massachusetts, and His Wife Mary [--] Riddlesdale," *New England Historical and Genealogical Register* 143[1989]: 220). In December 1647, following her husband's death, she married Sergeant Joseph Bixby of Ipswich, husbandman. They resided at Ipswich until 1660, when they moved to Rowley Village (now Boxford), Mass. There were nine children by this marriage, and their numerous descendants were covered by Willard G. Bixby, assisted by Eben Putnam in *A Genealogy of the Descendants of Joseph Bixby*, 1621-1701, of Ipswich and Boxford, Massachusetts, 3 vols. (New York, 1914).

Luke Heard came to the Massachusetts Bay Colony about 1636 settling first at Newbury, and later at Salisbury, where he was listed among the sixty-eight original settlers who received land in the "first division" in 1640. He was a constable there in 1643 (David Hoyt, *Old Families of Salisbury and Amesbury*, 382), but sold his land there with the house and planting lot to George Browne of Salisbury, on 19 Sept. 1645, upon his removal to Ipswich. Like his father, he was a linen weaver by trade, and he took his freeman's oath at Boston on 6 Sept. 1639.

His nuncupative will, which was proved 28th 7 mo. [Sept.] 1647, as witnessed by John Wyatt and Simon Tompson, both inhabitants of Ipswich. "The last will of Luke Herd Latly deceased about the [blank] Imprimis I give unto my eldest sonne John Herd ten pounds to be paid him at the age of 21 yeares Item I doe give unto my sonne Edmund five pounds to be paid him at the Age of 21 yeares Item I give unto my two sonnes to be equally parted between them my bookes* Alsoe this is my will that my two sonnes be brought up to writing & to reading & then when they shal be fitt to be putt forth to such trades as they shall Choose. Alsoe I make my loving wife Sarah Herd my sole executrix. Thus much as abovesaid was exprest by the above named Luke Herd in the presence of us. Witness: John (his mark) Wyatt, Simon Tompson." The inventory, presented in court the same day as the will, was taken by James How, Thomas Howlett and John Wyatt and included: shopp tooles, £6:0:0; all kinde of iron tooles, £1:2:0; iron potts, posnett and a Kettle, £1:2:0; a brasse kettle, 15s.; 12 pewter dishes & other pewter, £2:11:6; wooden ware, 6s.; fether bedds & bolsters, £6:10:0; a rugg, coverlett & curtins, £1:14:0; apparrell, £6:16:0; bookes, £4:10:0; linen, £2:9:0; cotten wooll, 6s.; a great chest, 2 boxes & chaires, £1:1:0; a muskett & pistolett, sword, bandaleers & powder, £1:16:8; scales & waites, £1:0:0; sackes a half bushell & a peck, 10s.; 3 Cowes & 3 steeres of 3 years old & two steeres of 2 years old & a heffer, £36:15:0; swine, £1:0:0; corne, wheate & indian, £5:1:0; total, £84:17:8 (Both the will and inventory appear in the Ipswich Deeds, Essex County Court House, Salem, Mass., 1:33, and are printed in *Essex County Quarterly Court Files*, 1:94).

The bond of marriage between the widow Sarah (Wyatt) Heard and Joseph Bixby was dated 15th 10 mo. [15 Dec.] 1647 and provided "I. That the two children of the said widow, weh were

left unto her by her late husband, Luke Hearde, of Ipswich, Linnen weaver, be well brought up and due meanes be used to teach them to read and write well as soon as they are cappable. 2. That at the age of thirteen yeares at the furthest, they be put forth to be apprentices in such trades as Mr. Nathaniel Rogers, their Grandfather Wyat, and Ensigne Howlet, in writing under their hand, or any two of them in like manner shall advise unto, and the children like of. 3. That unto the said children be paid, at the age of one and twenty yeares, fifteen pounds given them be will of their father, viz: ten pounds to the elder, at his time of one and twenty yeares, and five pounds to the younger when he shall bee at the like age; also that the bookes bequeathed them by their father be given them by equal division, according to his will. 4. That five pounds more be paid to the children of the said Sarah, (if living) or either of them at her will and discretion, as shee shall see cause to divide it in even or unequal portions to them, or to give the whole to the younger in case the elder be better provided for. 5. That the said Joseph and Sarah shall doe, or admit to bee done, any such further order as the Court of Ipswich shall see meet to require upon the motion of the said advisors, for the securing of the forementioned dues to the children, as well as for the freing of the said Joseph and Sarah from any entanglements on the children's part, by reason of her exequetrixship, or otherwise from hence arising beside the direct and true meaning and intent of these conditions. 6. That whereas, there is a portion of land in Asington, in Suffolke, in England, sch shall bee the right of the said Sarah after the decease of her mother, (the tenor whereof is not certainly known to us,) if the said Sarah shall have the whole and sole power to dispose of it, both the use and the gift of it, when and to whom she shall thinke meet. That then this obligation shall bee void and of none effect, otherwise to stand and bee of force." Signed, Joseph Bixby, Sarah (her mark) Heard. Witnesses, Margaret Rogers, John Rogers (Essex Institute Historical Collections, 1:7).

*In 1898 it was reported that "Mr. John T. Heard of Boston, Mass., has in his possession a Bible printed in 1599. It was brought from England to Ipswich by Luke Heard, the ancestor of the Ipswich Heards. Mr. John T. Heard received the Bible from his grandfather, Nathaniel Heard, who received it from his father, who was a grandson of Luke" (*The Maine Historical and Genealogical Recorder* 9[1898]:209). Efforts to locate the current whereabouts of the Bible have been fruitless.

In June 1677 Mary (Curtis) Heard asked for a separation "on the grounds of insufficiency" but a warrant of the court dated 25 June 1677 ordered them to live together as husband and wife. The further complaints by Mary Heard and her parents against the desertion of John Heard were countered by him and his half-brothers Benjamin and

Joseph Bixby, jr.; in July 1678, she was granted a divorce "unless he return within a month" (*Records and Files of the Quarterly Courts of Essex County, Mass.*, 6:295, 7:78). John Heard moved to Andover, Mass., where he purchased 40 acres of land near Blanchard's pond. On 23 May 1695 his brother Edmund was granted administration on his estate. The inventory presented 1 July 1695 by John Chandler and William Johnson consisted of 40 acres be it more or less of wilderness land and a small house, £22:10:0; a plow: a chain: [illegible] axe iorns: weges: Catell rings: Two axes: Two hos: & some other small tools belonging to husbandry work, £8:17:0; In Coats and linnin cloth, a rest head: to the vallis of £2:10:0. Edmund Heard "rendered an account of his trust" on 12 Oct. 1696 and had all the Estate left after debts (Essex Probate, no. 14303), including the land in Andover which remained in his possession until his own death.

SECOND GENERATION

3. EDMUND² HEARD (Luke¹) was born at Ipswich, Mass., in 1646, and died there, 28 Dec. 1713, aged 67 years, 3 days (according to a gravestone inscription copied by Arthur W. Dow in the Old North Burying Ground in Ipswich, but which stone had disappeared when the records were published [p. 114, *Ipswich Historical Society publication*, no. 29]; however, "In recent years it was discovered that the ancient tomb built, it is supposed, by Col. John Wainwright, had partly fallen in. The entrance had been closed some years ago with old gravestones which were removed from the graves where they had originally been placed." Among those was the gravestone of Edmund Heard (*Maine Historical and Genealogical Recorder*, 9:309). He married at Ipswich, 26 Sept. 1672 ELIZABETH WARNER, who died in 1724, in her 77th year, daughter of Daniel² (William¹) and Elizabeth (Denne) Warner.

Edmund Heard was one of the "ten of the young generation who took the covenant," 18 Jan. 1673/4, to become members of the church. Later that year, on 18 Nov. 1674 he purchased a commonage in Ipswich from Henry Archer for £20 in malt (Ipswich Deeds, 3:330) and another lot in the common field for £15 from John French on 14 Sept. 1677 (Ibid., 4:110).

Daniel Warner conveyed to his daughter and son-in-law Heard the use of the northeast end of his house on the present day Market Street, Ipswich, and provided that after his decease "all my said dwelling house and outhouses that shall be then standing upon the house lott that was my unckles, reserving still the privilege of the right of commonage, and most of the house lot that was Robert Crane's... provided he pay £10 each to his son William Warner, and his daughters Abigail and Susanna," 10 Sept. 1675 (Ipswich Deeds, 4:45). Edmund Heard built a new house on the lot prior to 1715.

The Ipswich town meeting appointed Edmund Heard as one of the surveyors of highways in 1696/7 and 1699/1700; as a tithingman, 1697/8 and 1703/4; and as a sealer of leather, every year from 1699/1700 through 1709/10. He was a cordwainer, or shoemaker, by trade, and this undoubtedly led to his appointment as a sealer of leather, a public office held by his descendants throughout the century.

He subscribed 8 shillings toward the new meetinghouse bell on 29 Feb. 1699/1700, and in 1700 was assigned a seat in the new meeting house.

Edmund, Nathaniel and Daniel Heard, as principals, with John Hovey and John Warner as sureties, were appointed administrators of the estate of Edmund Heard, 23 Jan. 1713 (Essex probate, 14300). An inventory was taken 28 Dec. 1713, and consisted of £141 real, including the land in Ipswich and Andover, and £70:7:1 personal. The estate was divided 18 July of that year. A receipt for £7:18:4 was signed by Offin and Sarah Boardman, 18 July 1724; a quitclaim to the estate was signed by Anthony and Elizabeth Somerby, 7 June 1725; and receipts for 50s. 5d. apiece were signed by Mary Brackenbury, granddaughter, 15 Oct. 1730, and William Brackenbury, grandson, 13 March 1732.

4. ELIZABETH³ HEARD (Edmund², Luke¹) was born at Ipswich, Mass., 7 May 1674, and died at Newbury, Mass., 26 Aug. 1762. She married (int. 1 March 1696/7) ANTHONY SOMERBY, who was born 25 Jan. 1670, and died 16 Sept. 1759, son of Abiel³ (Anthony², Richard¹) and Rebecca (Knight) Somerby.

Anthony Somerby of Newbury died intestate at the age of eighty-nine. His daughter Elizabeth Stickney, widow, was appointed administratrix with John Coats, caulker of Newbury, and Edmund Heard, cordwainer of Ipswich, as sureties (bond dated 26 Nov. 1759). The inventory of the estate included a dwelling house and barn with about $2\frac{1}{2}$ acres of land; about 8 acres of salt marsh in Newbury; 5 acres of land near the New Church in Newbury; a pew in the Newbury 4th Meetinghouse; plus personal and farm implements, totaling £359:15:8 (Essex Probate, file 25840).

- 5. SARAH³ HEARD (Edmund², Luke¹) was born at Ipswich, Mass. (VR), 6 May 1676, and died at Salisbury, Mass. (VR), 27 May 1738. She married at Ipswich, 28 Feb. 1698 OFFIN BOARDMAN, who was born at Ipswich, 3 Dec. 1676, and died at Salisbury, 22 March 1749, son of Thomas² (Thomas¹) and Elizabeth (Perkins) Boardman. He married second, at Newbury (VR), 24 April 1740 Judith Morss of Newbury.

They resided at Ipswich until 1707 when they moved to Newbury, Mass., from whence he moved to Salisbury, Mass., in 1729 or 1730. Capt. Boardman was at first a weaver, later a mariner or coaster, and the last few years of his life were spent as an innholder in Salisbury. His estate was valued at £1453:6:5, including dwelling-house, grist-mill, saw-mill, and lands in Salisbury, dwelling and lands in Newbury, dwelling and lands in North Yarmouth, County of York (now Maine), right in township of Nottingham, N.H., and "my Island in Kingstown, N.H., in the country pond, so called" (Charlotte Goldthwaite, comp., *Boardman Genealogy* [Hartford, Conn., 1895], 124).

Administration on Boardman's estate was granted, 20 Oct. 1735, and it was valued at £785:12:0.

6. ABIGAIL³ HEARD (Edmund², Luke¹) was born at Ipswich, Mass., 1679, and died there, 20 July 1712, aged 33 years, 2 months, 3 days. She married at Newbury, 3 Sept. 1707 WILLIAM BRACKENBURY, who married second (int. at Salem, 14 Aug. 1730) Mary Walcot and had further issue. Mary Brackenbury, widow of William Brackenbury, late of Ipswich, was granted administration on his estate, 8 Feb. 1742 (Essex Probate 323:111).

William Brackenbury owned a lot in Ipswich in 1728, and William Brackenbury of North Carolina, sold it to Nathaniel Farley, "Brackenbury's lot," 30 April 1771 (Essex Deeds, 129:112). It was later included in the assets of the Ipswich Mills (Waters, *Ipswich in the Mass. Bay Colony*).

- 7. EDMUND³ HEARD (Edmund², Luke¹) was born at Ipswich, Mass., 22 Feb. 1681, and died there (VR), Jan. 1755. He married first (int. at Ipswich [VR], 2 Nov. 1706) ANNAH TODD, who died at Ipswich (VR), 13 June 1709, aged 26, and was buried in the Old North Burial Ground, Ipswich, daughter of the widow Rachel Todd and stepdaughter of Joseph Goodhue of Ipswich (Hammatt, *Hammatt Papers*, 120). He married second (int. at Ipswich [VR], 7 Nov. 1713) DEBORAH OSGOOD, of Andover, Mass., who died at Ipswich (VR), 29 Aug. 1723, aged thirty-seven, and was buried in the Old North Burial Ground; she is said to have been the daughter of Capt. Christopher Osgood, who removed from Ipswich to Andover, and whose Ipswich homestead was where the five Heard children were born. However, the will of Thomas Asgood of South Carolina, probated 15 Jan. 1729, mentions his wife Lydia of Berkeley County and daughter Deborah, wife of Edmund Heard, living in Ipswich, Essex Co., New England (Moore and Simmonds, *Abstract of Wills of South Carolina, 1670-1740*, 136). He married third (int. at Ipswich, [VR], 5 Sept. 1724) REBECCA (YOUNG) KNOWLTON, who was born at Ipswich, 22 March 1681/2, and died there (VR), 21 Sept. 1728, daughter of Francis and Rebecca

(Smith) Young, and widow of John Knowlton. He married fourth at Ipswich (VR), 4 Feb. 1729 MARTHA KIMBALL, who was born at Ipswich 1 Feb. 1701, and died there in childbed (VR), 19 Oct. 1730, daughter of Richard and Lydia (Welles) Kimball. He married fifth at Ipswich (VR), 17 May 1732 ELIZABETH (LULL) CALDWELL, who was born at Ipswich, 28 Aug. 1692, and died there (VR), 27 June 1766, daughter of Thomas and Rebeckah (Kimball) Lull, and widow of John Caldwell, who had been "slaine by the Indians" on the coast of Maine.

Edmund Heard, Jr., "purchased by right of redemption all the estate of my honored father, Edmund Heard, deceased, and part of the same belonging to my brothers Nathaniel and Daniel." He was appointed as one of the surveyors of highways by the Ipswich town meeting in 1714/5; as tithingman in 1734/5; and as one of the sealers of leather for many terms, from 1720/1 through 1750/1 (Ipswich Town Records).

There is no probate record for him or his widow in Essex County.

He married (int. at Ipswich [VR], 10 Dec. 1709) AGNES HUNT, who was born at Ipswich, 5 April 1689, and was still living 12 April 1770 (see below), daughter of William³ (Samuel², William¹) and Sarah (Newman) Hunt.

In 1706 Nathaniel Heard had a seat assigned to him in the meetinghouse with his brother Edmund and ten others. Edmund Heard, jr., "having purchased by right of redemption all the estate of my honored father, Edmund Heard, decesased, and part of the same belonging to my brothers Nathaniel and Daniel" conveyed to Nathaniel "the southwest end of the old dwelling house where he now dwells and half of the shop and one third of the land or homestead" (Essex Deeds 30:80).

The Ipswich town meeting appointed Nathaniel Heard as a tithingman in 1719/20; sealer of leather in 1723/4; and as a surveyor of highways in 1728/9. He was a cordwainer, and in his will dated 9 Jan. 1730/1, and proved 2 Feb., gave £3 each to his children John, William, Elizabeth, Sarah and Hannah, and the balance of his estate to his wife "in Consideration That my Dear & Loving wife Agnis is weakly and That my Children are young and to bring up" (Essex Probate, file 14309).

The widow Agnes Heard was appointed guardian of their son William, 19 Oct. 1732 (ibid., file 14315). On 3 July 1733, she sold to Jacob Caldwell of Ipswich for £5 a "full 1/3 part at Jeffries neck Ipswich No. 172 drawn by my Father in law Heard" (Essex Deeds 70:234). On 16

March 1740, she sold to Samuel Waite, clothier of Ipswich for £49, "one full third part both as to quantity & quality of one certain old Lott Number Twenty Nine Scituate Lying & being in Bush Hill Eight so called in Ipswich aforesaid the said old Lott containing about Twelve acres be the same more or less Laid out to the Heirs of Edmund Heard late of Ipswich Deceasd..." (Essex Deeds 92:72). As widow of "Mr. Nathl Heard," she sold to her son John Heard of Ipswich "cordwinder," a lot of land in Ipswich's North Field, containing one and a half acre for £6:13:4 on 29 Aug. 1756 (ibid., 127:206). She was living on 12 April 1770 when her son John recommended her care to his sons Nathaniel and John (Essex Probate, file 14304). She is perhaps the Widow Heard who died at Ipswich, 11 Nov. 1775 (VR).

He married first (int. at Ipswich [VR], 5 Nov. 1715) MARY BAKER, who was born at Ipswich, 26 April 1695, and died there 24 Nov. 1763, daughter of William and Sarah (Fitts) Baker. He married second (int. at Ipswich [VR], 18 May 1765) REBECCA (FITTS) WILLIAMS, who died at Ipswich (VR), 24 Sept. 1788, aged 87, the widow of Dea. Samuel Williams.

Daniel Heard, with seven others, was granted permission to build a gallery "over the stairs on the southeast corner of the meeting house" on 26 Jan. 1710. In 1722, he was a surveyor of the highways; sealer of leather in 1725/6; hogreeve in 1729/30; and constable in 1733/4. In 1735/6 Daniel Heard was elected as a selectman of the town, and was re-elected in 1736/7, 1738/9, 1739/40, and 1741/2. From 1752 until his death he was a deacon of the church at Ipswich.

Daniel Heard of Ipswich, cordwainer, sold for £6 to his son Daniel Heard of Ipswich, "hous.right," three acres in Ipswich "in Birtch Island Devision so called in Bush Hill Eight" on 1 March 1755 (Essex Deeds 119:151). Daniel Heard of Ipswich, cordwainer, for £46:13:4, sold to Nathaniel Heard of Ipswich, cordwainer, "a Certain Messuage Consisting of the one half part of a Dwelling House at the Southwesterly end together with the southwesterly half of a barn, and Wood House and one Quarter & half quarter of an acre of land ajoyning..." in Ipswich, on 1 May 1758 (Essex Deeds 118:46).

Daniel Heard, of Ipswich, cordwainer, made his will on 14 May 1770 "Being weak of Body and Exercised with much Pain but of Perfect mind & memory Thanks Be Given to God." He mentioned his wife Rebecca; son Daniel to whom he left "all my lands in Ipswich excepting that

Part of my Homestead adjoining my House and Barn and running down to the lower end or northwesterly end of Mr. Jabez Treadwell's Land and so off to a square to land of the heirs of my son Nathl Heard decd; son Samuel and Jane his wife, who received the use and improvement of one-half part of a dwelling house; daughter Mary Barker, wife of Josiah Barker of Exeter; and daughter Tamasin Waite, wife of Benjamin Waite of Gloucester, each 20 shillings over what they already had; granddaughters Easter Heard and Sarah Heard, daughters of son Nathaniel deceased, 10 shillings each; six grandchildren, viz. Samuel, Elizabeth, Benjamin, Ebenezer, Jane and Mary (children of son Samuel), "all the homestead that I have given improvement of to their parents." Sons Daniel and Samuel Heard were appointed executors of the will, which was proved 28 Jan. 1771 (Essex Probate 346:452).

10. ABIGAIL⁴ HEARD (Edmund³⁻², Luke¹) was baptized at Ipswich, 5: 10 mo: 1714, and died there, 20 Jan. 1787. She married first (int. at Ipswich [VR], 27 Oct. 1739) DANIEL HODGKINS, who was baptized at Ipswich, 10 April 1716, and was lost at sea, about 1753 (although Hammatt, Early Inhabitants of Ipswich, gives 1763), the son of Daniel and Abigail (Hunt) Hodgkins. She married second (int. 19 Dec. 1756) DAVID PULCIFER of Ipswich.

According to Hammatt, Daniel Hodgkins was "lost at sea in 1763 [sic] and Daniel Heard was appointed guardian of the minor children. There is a curious story told traditionally among his descendants: 'Abigail Hodgkins, his wife, was much impressed by a dream. It seemed as if she were upon a most desolate island, vainly endeavoring to dry what was at that time worn as socks and nippers. She wandered about completely covered with the sense of desolation. Such was the depth of her depression, that she went to her neighbor's the next day, thinking that some expression would dispel the shadow; but it proved indeed a foreboding - her husband perished in the seas." Another story concerning her survives: "One of her grandchildren [Abigail Caldwell] went to see her when she was dying; she laid her hand on the child's head in benediction, but her tongue was palsied. The day of her death there was a snowstorm so severe that the windows and doors were covered. And at her burial the bier was carried over the roof of a one-story house that had been completely transfigured into a hill of snow" (ibid., 143).

12. EDMUND⁴ HEARD (Edmund³⁻², Luke¹) was baptized at Ipswich, Mass., 21 Aug. 1720; and died at Holden, Mass., 28 March 1769 (g.s.). He married (int. at Ipswich [VR], 25 Sept. 1742) PRISCILLA HASKELL, who was born at Gloucester, Mass., 18 Oct. 1718, and died between 17 Oct. 1782 and 7 Jan. 1783, daughter of Mark³ (Mark², William¹) and Martha (Tuttle) Haskell ("A Short Account of the Descendants of William Haskell of Gloucester, Massachusetts," *Essex Institute Historical Collections* 32[1896]: 133-95). Through her mother she was descended from Isaac Allerton of the *Mayflower*.

In the meeting house which was built in 1749, Edmund Heard, jr., became the purchaser of the pew on the westerly corner of the gallery, No. 25. He was appointed as a tithingman for the town in 1752; and served as one of the sealers of leather from 1753 through 1761. On 20 May 1760 he sold to Nathaniel Lord of Ipswich, two parcels of land "leying in Bush Hill pasture" (unrecorded deed, Ipswich Historical Society). He was dismissed from the church at Ipswich, 20 June 1762 to the one in Holden, Mass. Edmund Heard, cordwainer of Holden, made his will, 4 Jan. 1769, and it was proved on 31 July 1769. The following bequests were made: to son Thomas, the northwest part of the farm in Holden at the age of twenty-one; to son William, the easterly part of the farm at age of twenty-one; to son Mark, one piece northeast of the farm and one piece southeast of it; to wife Priscilla, executrix, "all my personal Estate and moveable afects and Negros together with Nine acres of Land lying in the town of Ipswich which was given Her by her Father" and also all lands, house, barn and mills not already disposed of; to daughter Martha, £33:6:8 in household goods; daughter Priscilla already had her portion; to daughter Eunice, same as daughter Martha. Inventory on the estate included real estate in Holden (£300), real estate in Ipswich (£54), in notes (£33:8:5), five beds "and their Furniture" (£26:6:6); Table Linnen (£1:10:0); one male & one Female Negro (£66:13:4); and other belongings, the total estate being valued at £577:17:9 (Worcester County Probate, no 32598). Priscilla Heard's will, dated 17 Oct. 1782, proved 7 Jan. 1783, mentioned daughter Eunice, sons Edmund, Mark and William, and the children of her daughters Priscilla and Martha (Worcester Co. Probate, 18:242).

Thomas Heard, yeoman of Holden, sold 12 acres of land in Holden to John Willington, yeoman, for £10:16:0 on 3 April 1773 (Worcester Deeds 70:633). Administration on his estate was granted to William Heard, yeoman, of Holden, 5 May 1778 (Worcester Probate, no. 32610A); division of the estate was apparently given in favor of his siblings as on 9 July 1778, Edmund Heard, cordwainer of Lancaster, Mass., for £53:6:8 sold to his brother William Heard, husbandman of Holden, his portion of their brother Thomas's portion of their father's estate (Worcester Deeds 108:325).

 Dillington Johnson of Paxton was appointed her guardian after her father's death (Worcester Probate, no. 32599A). Eunice Heard, daughter of Eunice Heard, bp. 30 Sept. 1781 at Holden was probably her illegitimate daughter (New England Historical and Genealogical Register 58[1904]: 279). Eunice Heard, lace-maker, sold for £13:5:8 to her brother William Heard, husbandman of Holden, her share in the portion of the estate of their father left to their brother Thomas, deceased, 31 Oct. 1782 (Worcester Deeds 108:323).

13. JOHN⁴ HEARD (Nathaniel³, Edmund², Luke¹) was baptized at Ipswich, Mass., 11 Oct. 1713, and died there [VR], 13 April 1770. He married at Ipswich [VR], 9 Dec. 1736 ABIGAIL WARNER, who was baptized 3 Aug. 1718, and died at Ipswich [VR], of rheumatism, 9 Feb. 1797, daughter of Nathaniel and Mary (Tuttle) Warner.

John Heard was a cordwainer in Ipswich. He served the town as a surveyor of highways, 1739/40; fence viewer, 1746/7; hogreeve, 1750/1; and tithingman, 1753.

His will was dated 12 April 1770 and probated 23 April 1770 (Essex Probate, file 14304). He bequeathed to his wife Abigail, all the household goods and one cow; "also I Give her the Best Bed that now is Improved by my mother after my mothers Deceass." The widow was also to receive annually four bushels of grain, fifty weight of good pork, one hundred weight of good beef, the use and improvement of the northeast end of his dwelling house, and the use of part of his pew. His son Nathaniel received the "whole of my marsh ground at a place called Reddy Marsh... one moity in pasture land at Sanders Brook... & half my tillage at a place called Burch Island" Son John received the southwest end of the dwelling house and a moiety of pasture and tillage. Son Aaron was to receive two acres in the North Common fields. His four daughters, Abigail, Sarah, Hannah and Lucy, were jointly to receive the northeast end of the dwelling house. Daughter Elizabeth, wife of Benjamin Cross, received forty shillings. Sons Nathaniel and John were appointed executors and instructed "to maintain their Grandmother Hearde and support her Comfertably both in Sickness and in helth."

 The 1790 census of Ipswich listed his household with one male over 16, one male under 16, and one female. In the 1800 census, there was one male between 10&16, one male between 26&45, and one female over 45. 21. NATHANIEL⁴ HEARD (Daniel³, Edmund², Luke¹) was baptized at Ipswich, Mass., 31 March 1734, and died there (VR), 18 June 1762. He married (int. at Ipswich [VR], 25 March 1758) ESTHER GOULD, who was baptized at Ipswich, 20 October 1734, and died 30 Jan. 1807, daughter of John and Esther Gould. She married second (int. at Ipswich [VR], 10 Feb. 1765) Abel Huse of Ipswich, who died 9 April 1770; and married third (int. 29 Nov. 1771) Joseph Fowler.

Nathaniel Heard served during the French and Indian Wars in the Lake George Campaign, as a substitute for Mark Platt (1755), the Campaign of 1758, the Quebec expedition (1759) and the Montreal expedition (1760).

He was a cordwainer. His will, dated 14 June 1762 and probated 9 Aug. 1762, gave his wife Esther the free use and improvement of his entire estate, which was eventually to be divided among his daughters Esther, "Thomasin," and Sarah (Essex Probate, file 14310).

22. EDMUND⁵ HEARD (Edmund⁴⁻³⁻², Luke¹) was baptized at Ipswich, Mass., 4 Sept 1743, and died at Newport Twp., Lower Canada, 13 Feb. 1814 [Samuel A.7 Hurd family rec.]. He married first at Worcester, Mass., 20 (28 [Samuel A.⁷ Hurd family rec.]) June 1765, SARAH WILLINGTON, who was born at Worcester, 26 May 1743, and died 10 Sept. 1770 [Samuel A.⁷ Hurd family rec.], daughter of Ebenezer and Annabelle (Benjamin) Willington; her brother John Willington married his sister Priscilla⁵ Heard. He married second 1 June 1772 ELIZABETH ANDREWS, who was born 22 July 1746, and died at Deerfield, Mass., 8 Dec. 1832, daughter of Thomas³ (Daniel²⁻¹) and Sarah (Jacobs) Andrews of Salem Village (now Danvers), Mass. ("Descendants of Daniel Andrew of Salem," *Essex Antiquarian* 3[1899]:137); buried Laurel Hill Cemetery, Deerfield in the lot of her daughter Hannah. According to the Deerfield Vital Records, Elizabeth was "daughter" of Col. Edmund Heard and died in Newport, R.I.; the gravestone inscription makes her "Relict of Col. Edmund Heard, late of Newport, S.C." Presumably both refer to Newport, Lower Canada (now Province of Quebec).

Edmund Heard, from Boston, and wife Sarah, from Worcester, were warned out of Sutton, Mass., on 19 Aug. 1766 (*Worcester County, Massachusetts, Warnings, 1737-1788* [Worcester, Mass., 1899], 71). They resided in Worcester, Mass., in 1768, and later he lived in Lancaster, Mass., where he was Town Clerk from 1788 to 1790 and was Master of the Trinity Lodge of Freemasons. He was initiated into the Masons on 9 Oct. 1777 at St. Andrew's Lodge, and was a charter member of Trinity Lodge, 30 Jan. 1778, but was suspended by Trinity Lodge on 5 April 1796.

Edmund Heard, cordwainer, of Lancaster, Mass., on 9 July 1778 (for £53:6:8) sold to his brother William Heard, husbandman of Holden, his portion of their brother Thomas's portion of their father Edmund Heard's estate (Worcester County Deeds 108:325). On 19 June 1787 Martha Safford of Harvard widow (she was widow of John Safford and a sister of Priscilla Haskell who married Edmund⁴ Heard); Edmund Heard of Lancaster, gentleman; Mark Heard of Rutland, blacksmith; and William Heard of Holden, yeoman, for £21 sold to Joseph Lord of Ipswich, cabinetmaker 2/7's of ½ of a dwelling house with the land under and adjoining it in Ipswich: beginning at the fore door of the house running north through the chimney four rods thence east two rods and one foot thence north by said Joseph Lord's land to Doctor Manning's land thence east by said Manning's land to Capt. Ebenezer Lord's land to the said Joseph Lord's land thence west and south on the said Joseph Lord's land to the street thence west by the street to the bounds first mentioned (Essex Deeds 148:45). "He distinguished himself with a number of other persons, in protesting in the public Newspapers, against those measures which led to the Revolution, in so much, that he, and his famely, suffered greatly, his Name, together with his occupation, was published in printed handbills, and distributed round the country, cautioning all persons against dealing with your petitioner or afford him or his Famely, any assistance or support, until he should sign the Solemn League and Covenant so called, which he absolutely refused to do - And finding himself in this deplorable situation, he in the spring of the year 1775 formed a plan to escape into this Province with his famely and Join in the Royal Cause - For which purpose he privately conveyed a considerable part of his property to Skeensborough on Lake Champlain, and obtained a Letter from General Gage, at Boston, to Captain Delaplace.

Commanding the British forces at Crown Point, to afford your petitioner aid, and support on his intended rout - But unfortunately for your petitioner before he could arrive at the Point and while on the road theither, Captain Delaplace and the Troops under his command wer supprized, and taken Prisoners by Allen, Arnold &c. and your petitioners Goods and efects, were seized on the Lake, and distributed among the Rebel forces, and himself taken prisoner and carried to Crown Point, where he was held a prisoner until the Month of October, when he was sent back into the States and Committed to close prison, so that it was never in his power afterwards to join the British Forces...." (Land grants in Lower Canada, Public Archives of Canada, Public Records Division, Microfilm reel C-2532, p. 51121).

He was commissioned as colonel "to the First Regiment of Cavalry in the Seventh Division of the Militia... comprehending the County of Worcester" by Gov. John Hancock, 22 March 1791. The commission is now in the Byington Collection, Society for the Preservation of New England Antiquities, Boston.

In February 1792 Heard saw the proclamation of General Clark offering land grants in Canada, and moved his family - consisting of three sons and two daughters - upon receiving the promise of 1200 acres in Newport, Lower Canada (now in Compton County, Province of Quebec), from Stephen Williams, the proprietor of the township. He moved onto the land in the Spring of 1793 and petitioned the Governor of Lower Canada to confirm his right to the land on 24 June 1797 (ibid., p. 51116). On 21 March 1801, he petitioned the lieutenant governor of Lower Canada for grants to his wife Elizabeth, son Luke and daughters Sally and Hannah, in lands north of "His Majestys wast Lands" in Newport as reimbursement for the £500 property loss he suffered during the American Revolution (ibid., p. 51121). On 1 July 1801, Edmund Heard was granted lots 5, 6, 8 and 11 in Range 9, and lots 6 and 7 in the 10th Range at Newport (ibid., p. 51124).

A modern plaque near the Maple Leaf Cemetery at Randboro, Que., states: "In 1793 Col. Edmund Heard and Capt. Josiah Sawyer explored from Missisquoi Bay to this site. Near here they slashed the first ten acres of land in Newport Township (Compton County). This cemetery was donated in 1802 by William Heard."

23. PRISCILLA⁵ HEARD (Edmund⁴⁻³⁻², Luke¹) was baptized at Ipswich, Mass., 6 July 1746, and was dead by 17 Oct. 1782, when her mother made her will. She married at Holden, Mass. (VR), 2 June 1763, JOHN WILLINGTON of Worcester, Mass., the son of Ebenezer and Annabelle

(Benjamin) Willington; his sister Sarah married her brother Edmund Heard.

John Willington, yeoman, purchased from his brother-in-law Thomas Heard, yeoman of Holden, 12 acres of land in Holden for £10:16:0 on 3 April 1773 (Worcester Deeds 70:633). He served as a private in Maj. Paul Raymond's company of mlitia from Holden, which marched to Cambridge, 19 April 1775.

24. MARK⁵ HEARD (Edmund⁴⁻³⁻², Luke¹) was born 26 June 1748 (family Bible record from Bible printed in Philadelphia in 1811, and which in 1934 was in the possession of Bessie Upham, Orange, Mass., copy in New York State Library; hereafter cited as Mark Heard Bible) was baptized at Ipswich, Mass., 19 June 1748, and died 10 April 1829 (ibid.). He married first 6 Aug. 1771 (ibid.) SARAH SMITH, who was born at Worcester, Mass., 7 Nov. 1748 (VR; Aug., Mark Heard Bible), and died 26 August 1790 (ibid.), daughter of Elijah and Susannah Smith. He married second at Rutland, Mass., 5 Jan. 1792 (VR; Bible gives 4 Jan.) NANCY McCOBB, who was born 21 May 1754, and died 25 Oct. 1816 (ibid.), daughter of William and Mary (Crawford) McCobb of Rutland.

They were residing in Lancaster, Mass., in 1775, and later moved to Rutland, Mass., where he was a blacksmith in 1787 (Essex Deeds, 143:45). Mark Heard was a private in Captain Benjamin Houghton's company of Minute-Men, Col. John Whitcomb's Regiment, which marched on the alarm of 19 April 1775 to Cambridge - service eight days. He was reported enlisted in the Army in Capt. Andrew Haskell's company, Col. Asa Whitcomb's regiment. He enlisted on 27 April 1775 for a service of three months and twelve days but was still listed on the company returns on 6 Oct. 1775. Mark Heard, "cutler" of Paxton, for £5 sold on 20 May 1778 ten acres in Holden, being part of the land willed him by his father Edmund, to "Prissillah Heard," lace maker, and her son William Heard, yeoman, both of Holden (Worcester Deeds 108:323). Through the annual town meeting, the voters of Paxton elected Mark Heard as a warden in 1780 and as a field-driver in 1783.

In 1787 he was listed as a blacksmith of Rutland (Essex County Deeds, 148:40). Mark Heard of Paxton, "cutler," and his wife Sarah for £35:13:4, sold to William Heard of Holden, miller, a portion of the estate of their father Edmund, late of Holden, 3 Feb. 1790 (Worcester Deeds 108:324). On 16 Feb. 1804 when he signed a deed listing him as a yeoman of Rutland, Mass. (ibid., 156:427).

The 1790 census listed his household at Rutland as consisting of one male over sixteen, one male under sixteen, and four females. On 29 Aug. 1791, Mark Heard, blacksmith of Rutland was appointed administrator of the estate of his late wife Sarah (Worcester Co. Probate, file 32609A). He was listed as a yeoman of Rutland when for \$400 from Thomas Heard, yeoman of Rutland, he sold 25 acres in the westerly part of Rutland on the Oakham line on 16 Feb. 1804. That deed was co-signed by Nancy Heard (Worcester Deeds 156:427). No probate records exist for him in

Worcester County.

Dillington Johnson of Paxton was appointed guardian of his sister-in-law Eunice Heard upon the death of her father. He served as sergeant in Capt. David Prouty's company, Col. Job Cushing's (Worcester County) Regiment, which marched on 27 July 1777 and was discharged on 28 Aug. 1777. The company marched to reinforce the Northern Army by order of General Warner (*Mass. Soldiers & Sailors*, 8:823). At the time of the 1790 census, Dillington Johnson lived in Rutland at the head of a household which also included four males under sixteen and two females.

He married first at Holden, Mass., 16 Jan. 1783 (VR) BETSEY DIX of Holden, Mass., who was born in 1756, and died 5 September 1794 (memorial stone, Maple Leaf Cemetery, Randboro, Que.). He married second at Northumberland, N.H., 28 March 1797 THIRZA Z. WILLIAMS, who was born at Wilmington, Vt., 11 May 1778, and died at Barnston, Que., 4 Aug. 1859 (Bible record, James Family Papers,

State Historical Society of Wisconsin; note: the Bible record was apparently not a contemporary record as several of the events are listed out of order). William and Thirza are buried in the Maple Leaf Cemetery, Randboro, Que.

William Heard was the fifer for Capt. Phineas Moore's (Paxton, Mass.) company of Minute-Men, Col. Ephraim Doolittle's regiment, which marched on the alarm of 19 April 1775 to Cambridge, serving eight days. He was also in Capt. Adam Wheeler's company, Col. Doolittle's regiment, in which regiment he remained until at least 6 Oct. 1775 and perhaps as late as January 1776. His widow Thirza, then of Barnston, Canada East, on 3 Nov. 1849 applied for a United States pension based on the fact that he "was a fifer and served in the War of the Revolution from Paxton, Mass., on alarm 8 days. - under Captain Phineas Morris, Col. Doolittle Regt. - Also that he served as fifer in the year 1775 Eight months from Holden Mass. under Capt. Adam Wheeler - Col. Doolittle Regt." She was granted an annual pension of \$31,25 on 17 April 1851 retroactive to 4 March 1848 (No. W7712, Military Service Records, National Archives). On 11 April 1855, she was of Hatley, Stanstead County, Canada East, when she applied for bounty land from the U.S. government. This was apparently declined as no further record appears in the file (Bounty land warrant 10032-16055, Military Service Records, National Archives).

He was a husbandman of Holden when he bought from his sister Eunice her share in the estate of their brother Thomas, 31 Oct. 1782 (Worcester Deeds, 108:323). In 1787 he was called a yeoman of Holden (Essex Deeds 148:45). His household at Holden consisted of one male over 16, two males under 16 and three females at the 1790 census. Sometime around 1800 he moved from Holden to Newport, Lower Canada, where his brother Edmund had settled earlier. He is said to have resided at Northumberland and Stewartstown, N.H., before going to Canada. He was appointed one of the Town's associates and was granted lot 8 in Range 10, and lots 10, 11 and 12 in the 7th Range (land grants in Lower Canada, Public Archives of Canada, Public Records Division, Microfilm reel C-2532).

John Heard was a cordwainer and member of Capt. Thomas Burnham's company, which marched on the alarm of 19 April 1775, serving three days; he purchased a portion of the Daniel Warner homestead in Ipswich, 1 May 1776 from Jonathan Prince (Essex Deeds 134:262) and sold a part of it to his brother-in-law Moses Lord, Jr., on 21 Dec. 1790 (ibid., 152:139) with his mother retaining a tenement there. He was called John Heard "3d" at the time of his first marriage, and John Heard "Jr." at his second marriage. John Heard, Jr., of Ipswich, cordwainer, on 30 April 1778 purchased for £200 from Joshua Burnham of Lynn, cordwainer, five acres of land in Ipswich. The 1790 Census of Ipswich listed in his household two males over 16, four males under 16, and four females. He died intestate and Nathaniel Heard, cordwainer of Ipswich was appointed administrator (Essex Probate, file 14305). His sons John, Nathaniel and William were placed under the guardianship of James Hodge, cordwainer of Newburyport, 11 May 1798; and his son Nathaniel was on 7 September 1802 placed under the guardianship of Joseph

Hodgkins of Ipswich (Essex Probate, file 14311).

- 29. AARON⁵ HEARD (John⁴, Nathaniel³, Edmund², Luke¹) was baptized at Ipswich, Mass., 17 Feb. 1750, and died at Morristown, Vt., 1 April 1836 (VR), aged 85 (g.s. Cemetery, Morristown Corners). He married first at Ipswich (VR), 30 Aug. 1781 Mrs. SARAH POTTER. He married second at Cambridge, Vt., 30 Sept. 1793 ABIGAIL ----, who died at Morristown, 13 March 1841, aged 85 (g.s., VR).

Aaron Heard enlisted in the army 13 May 1775 as of Charlestown, Mass., and was put in Capt. Joseph Chadwick's company, Col. Richard Gridley's (Artillery) Regiment, as a sergeant; he was still in the Army as of 21 Nov. 1775. On 5 June 1778 Aaron Heard, leather dresser, for £167 purchased of his brother John Heard, Jr., "land in Ipswich containing a Dwelling house & barn, bounded by the County Road near the Great Bridge over the Ipswich River by land of Jeremiah Fitts, easterly by said Fitts land to the River, westerly by the River till it comes to the highway by the bridge, thence by the highway to the bounds first mentioned" (Essex Deeds 136:74). Joseph Brown, a housewright of Ipswich, was awarded damages and court costs, totaling £19:1:6 in November 1786 against Aaron Fitz and Aaron Heard, both leather dressers of Ipswich. This was still unpaid on 5 July 1787 when Brown demanded their arrest pending complete payment even though Aaron Heard was by this time "late of Ipswich" (Essex Deeds 147:23). On 15 Oct. 1787 Fitts's property was seized to cover the debt. On 7 March 1788 Aaron Heard of Londonderry, N.H., yeoman, sold the land described above in Ipswich to Elijah Foster of Rowley (Essex Deeds 149:23).

30. LUCY⁵ HEARD (John⁴, Nathaniel³, Edmund², Luke¹) was baptized at Ipswich, Mass., 22 July 1753, and died there (VR), 26 Feb. 1794. She married at Ipswich (VR), 1 Nov. 1787 MOSES LORD, Jr., who was baptized 18 April 1762, son of Moses and Mary (Lord) Lord.

He was a chairmaker, and purchased a portion of the old Daniel Warner homestead in Ipswich from his brother-in-law John Heard, 21 Nov. 1790 (Essex Deeds, 152:139).

31. WILLIAM⁵ HEARD (William⁴, Nathaniel³, Edmund², Luke¹) was baptized at Ipswich, Mass., 30 Nov. 1746, and died 8 Oct. 1808. He married 9 Dec. 1772 Mrs. ABIGAIL (CROCKETT) KILSO, who was born 14 March 1754 (family record in possession of Charles S. Candage), and died 22 Dec. 1841, in her 88th year (according to her gravestone), daughter of Nathaniel⁴ (John³, Joshua², Thomas¹) and Margaret (Andrews) Crockett. She was the widow of George Killsa, whom she married 15 Dec. 1769, and who was probably from Nottingham, N.H., and drowned at Ash Point, Maine (Leon Crockett, *The Crockett Family of New England, 1632-1943*). The *Maine Historical Magazine* listed the marriage of "John Kelsey and Abigail Crockit, both of a place called the Fox Islands" on 15 December 1769 (9:139), and of William Heard and Abigail Kelsey both "of a place called the Fox Island" on 9 Dec. 1772 (9:140).

About 1770 William Heard with his brother James went from Vinalhaven to South Thomaston, Me., settling at Ash Point, near Nathaniel Crockett. "Mr. Heard, besides farming, soon commenced and carried on the manufacture of salt, which he gradually extended to seven, eight and ultimately to twelve kettles. These were kept constantly boiling in the summer season, except in the time of high freshets; but, before the close of the Revolution, the works, or all that was combustible about them, were burnt by British privateers or marauding Tories. One such raiding party also entered his house, inquired where the men were, would not believe the answer, said they must be hidden, or had fled with the money; threatened the women; and set fire to the house. Obtaining no information or prospect of plunder, they finally put out the fire they had kindled and departed" (Eaton, *History of Thomaston, Rockland, and South Thomaston, Maine*). William Heard served on the Committee of Safety from South Thomaston in 1779.

William Heard bought from Gen. Henry Knox of Revolutionary fame, 200 acres of land in Thomaston (now that part of Owls Head known as Ash Point), for \$149.82 on 8 January 1800 (Knox Co. Deeds 9:173). He bought another 100 acres in Ash Point from Gen. Knox, 12 Oct. 1801 for \$400 (ibid., 10:213), and 91 acres more for \$100 on the same date (ibid.). Much of this land was given to General Knox for his service during the Revolution, but as it had already been

settled there was much transferring of land back and forth. On 26 September 1807 William Heard bought from Israel Thorndike and Daniel Sears of Boston, for \$104, Ash Point Island (9 acres), Fisherman's Island (5 acres), Birch Island (4 acres) and Oak Island (½ acre) (ibid., 17:51). His descendants have been extensively traced by Charles S. Candage of Hallowell, Maine, in *Descendants of William Heard and Abigail Crockett of Ash Point, Maine, 1746-1987*. Mr. Candage has contributed significantly to this project over a number of years.

- 32. JAMES⁵ HEARD (William⁴, Nathaniel³, Edmund², Luke¹) was born baptized at Ipswich, Mass., 21 May 1749 (although the family Bible, as printed in Leon O. Crockett, *Early Heard [Hurd] Family of Penobscot Bay* [hereafter cited as James Heard Bible], gives birthdate as 25 May), and died at Newfield, Maine, 21 March 1832 (the *Morning Star* gives 28 March, p. 163, David C. Young & Robert L. Taylor, *Death Notices from Freewill Baptist Publications, 1811-1851* [Bowie, Md., 1985]). He was buried in the small Heard family cemetery (north side of Route 203, next to the brook, near the former E. Carlton residence, Newfield). He married at the Hamlet Parish Church, Ipswich (VR), 8 Dec. 1779 ELIZABETH HODGKINS, who was born 3 Dec. 1755 (James Heard Bible), baptized at Ipswich, 21 Dec. 1755 and died 18 May 1841, the daughter of Moses and Elizabeth (Quarles) Hodgkins.

Elizabeth Hodgkins of Ipswich, spinster, confessed herself guilty of fornication--"whereof she had a bastard child born of her at Ipswich, 25 May last"-- before the Essex County Court of General Sessions (July 1778, Salem) and was fined 10 shillings. The child "David R., Born May

25 1778" is listed at the head of the list of their children in the family Bible record of James and Elizabeth (Hodgkins) Heard. He was probably among the four males under 16 listed in the household of James Heard at Vinalhaven, Me., in the 1790 census. No further information on him is known.

James Heard, a "minor upwards of 14," was appointed to the guardianship of Daniel Heard, jr., joiner of Ipswich, 22 Oct. 1765 (Essex Probate, file 14302). About 1770 James Heard went to Maine with his brother William, settling at the Fox Islands (now Vinalhaven). On 17 April 1772 William conveyed to James six small islands lying off the westerly cost of Great Fox Island, beginning with Hurricane Island and extending northerly and northwesterly as far as Heard's Island and including that island and all islands between those points. Within a few years, they moved to South Thomaston, where William remained and where some of his descendants live today.

After the outbreak of the Revolution, James returned to Ipswich to serve in his local company. From his pension file comes the following deposition of Nathaniel Wade and Joseph Hodgkins, captain and lieutenant respectively, with Col. Moses Little's 12th Regiment of Foot. "James Heard... enlisted as a soldier in your said Company prior to the said first day of January 1776 to serve therein untill the first day of January 1777; and that the said James Heard served faithfully in our said Company during the whole term of time for which he enlisted - And at the request of General Washington continued in the service one month after the time for which he enlisted had expired, and was honorably discharged. The said James Heard was a soldier in our company in said Colonel Little's Regiment in the eight months service 1775" (National Archives Records Administration, Military Records Division, File Designation James Heard, W23263 rev). The movement of this company during the period were: 7 May 1775, at Cambridge; 8 September 1775, Camp at Prospect Hill; 2 April 1776, on the march "Whalpool"; 4 April, Providence, received General Washington; 10 April, New London, embark for New York; 24 April, New York; 9 May, Long Island; 30 September, Fort Constitution, N.J.; 3 December, Peekshill; 20 December, Buckingham, Pa.; 31 December, New Jersey crossing; 11 January 1777, Valley Forge; July, Worcester, on the march; 28 September 1777, Saratoga, in camp; 19 October, Saratoga, Burgoyne's surrender; 27 October, Albany, expect to march to Philadelphia for a winter camp; and 1 January 1778, Valley Forge (Essex Institute Historical Collections 14:241).

After this James Heard returned to Thomaston, Maine, where he purchased land there of John Adams, 20 March 1778. During 1779, he again served with the army, this time from 8 July to 24 September as a private in Capt. Philip M Ulmers co., Col. McCobbs Regiment; and then briefly returned to Massachusetts to serve 14 October to 22 November 1779 in Capt. Thomas Cummings's company, Col. Jacob Gerrish's Massachusetts Regiment as a private with service at Claverack ("Revolutionary soldiers and sailors of Knox County, Maine," by Edward Kalloch Gould. Typescript in the Maine State Library, Augusta, p. 68).

It was after this last military service that he was married at Ipswich. The family resided at Vinalhaven at the time of the 1790 census, but moved to Newfield, Maine, the next year. They were still called of the Fox Islands, on a deed dated 10 October 1791 (Knox Co. Deeds, 1:21). Soon after that he bought land for his homestead west of Newfield village. His mother-in-law and her second husband, William Campernell, with her daughter and son-in-law, Thomas and Lucy (Hodgkins) Day, also settled in Newfield. James Heard of Newfield, yeoman, sold to his son John Heard of Newfield, yeoman, sixty acres in Newfield being part of lot 10, Range K, on

20 Dec. 1814 (York Co. Deeds 142:152). In July 1820, when applying for a Revolutionary War pension, he listed his family residing with him as wife Elizabeth, 65 years and "very infirm," and 4-year-old grandson Robert Heard. His "Schedule of the real estate and personal estate, (Necessary clothing and bedding excepted) belonging to me... No house nor land, 2 pigs, a few articles of old furniture." Of himself he wrote, I "by occupation am a chair maker which I am unable to pursue by reason of old age & infirmities" (Pension application, National Archives). He was enrolled on the Maine district pension roll retroactively to April 1818 at the rate of eight dollars per month. On 1 Oct. 1829 his son William for \$500 sold James Heard twenty acres of lot 10, Range K in Newfield; the deed was co-signed by Mercy Heard, the second wife of William (York Deeds 146:104).

James Heard of Newfield made his will on 24 April 1824, giving his wife Elizabeth "all the household furniture, Beds, bedding &c during her life and then to be equally divided between my three daughters Elizabeth Stone, Lucy Heard & Mary Day." "To my Son John Heard I give & bequeath all the land if any then be belonging to Lot No. ten in Range K excepting what I have heretofore sold to Nathaniel Heard & Nathaniel Jordan." Son William received two notes which were held against him; sons James and Daniel were to receive fifty dollars each from son John if he received the land above mentioned; the residue of the estate went to wife Elizabeth for her life and then was to be equally divided among the children. Son John Heard was appointed executor, however he died before the will was probated and an administration was appointed by the court (York Co. Probate, file 8962).

Widow Elizabeth Heard was living at Chatham, N.H., when she received a pension payment there. She was still there, aged 84, on 1 June 1840, when she was listed in *A Census of Pensioners for Revolutionary or Military Services* (Washington, 1841), p. 18.

Their family Bible, published in New York in 1824, was in 1985 owned by a descendant, Harry Collemer of West Rockport, Me.

- 33. DANIEL⁵ HEARD (Daniel⁴⁻³, Edmund², Luke¹) was baptized at Ipswich, Mass., 16 May 1742, and died at Wells, Maine, 6 Feb. 1822 (VR). He married LYDIA ----, who died at Wells, Maine, 15 Dec. 1812 (VR).

Daniel Heard was a saddler of Wells, when he bought one-half acre of land at Wells from Samuel Hatch, Jr., of Wells on 15 July 1765 (York County, Maine, Deeds 40:72). Among other

property transactions, he bought two acres in Wells from Warwick Hubbard of Wells, 5 July 1766 (York Deeds 39:212); bought 38 acres in Wells from Jonathan Littlefield, 16 Aug. 1780 (York Deeds 46:124); bought 19 acres in Wells from the First Parish of Wells on 5 Jan. 1796 (York Deeds, 60:132). He made his will on 7 June 1815, and it was proved on 13 May 1822 with his son John as executor. A death notice in the *Strafford [N.H.] Register*, 26 Feb. 1822, called him "formerly of Ipswich."

He married first at Hampton, N.H., Oct. 1766 ELIZABETH ANN STORY, who was born at Boston, 9 Sept. 1745, and died at Ipswich (VR), 13 June 1775, in her thirtieth year, daughter of William and Elizabeth (Marion) Story, formerly of Boston (Perley Derby, "Elisha Story of Boston and Some of His Descendants," *Essex Institute Historical*

Collections 50[1914]:299-300). He married second 9 Feb. 1777, as his second wife, SARAH "SALLY" STANIFORD, who was baptized at Ipswich, 10 Nov. 1751, and died at Ipswich (VR), 12 Sept. 1796, aged forty-five, daughter of Daniel and Mary (Burnham) Staniford, and step-daughter of Rev. Nathaniel Rogers of the First Church at Ipswich (Edward F. Staniford, *The Staniford Family History* [Sacramento, Calif., 1960]).

John Heard was a housewright until he joined in business with his brother-in-law, William Story, Jr., in the distillery of William Story, Sr., of which they purchased halves on 1 May 1770 (Essex Deeds, 128:71, 11). The younger Story apparently left the business soon thereafter, as Heard paid off the several mortgages against the property by himself, 22 Feb. 1772 (ibid., 130:67, 68). The business proved profitable, and Heard began to acquire property in Ipswich, and expanded the business through involvement in the West Indies trade. The papers of the business, as well as John Heard's other business and personal papers, are among the Heard Collection at the Baker Library, Harvard University, Boston, Mass.

He purchased on 1 April 1776 a lot in the South Parish of Ipswich, and probably built a house on that lot soon afterwards (Waters, *Ipswich*, 1:477). He sold half of the house to his brother Nathaniel in 1786 (Essex Deeds, 301:9), and sold his remaining interest to Richard Lakeman in 1795 (ibid., 168:44). On 22 March 1777, John Heard, "gentleman," bought from John Calef, the old Calef homestead on the north side of South Main Street (ibid., 135:264).

John Heard first served in public office as a "Clerk of the Market" and hog-reeve, elected 3 March 1777. The next year he was appointed Coroner of Essex County, a position which he held until 1796. He served in a number of local positions, including the Committee of Correspondence & Safety, to which he was added on 16 Aug. 1777 (Ipswich Town Records, 3:292, 4:8), and he also served on the committee "to procure the men that are now Called for as this Towns Quota of the Continental Army" (ibid., 4:26). Another aspect of his activities during the Revolution was as an investor in several privateers. After the Revolution, his interests in ships concentrated in long term investments rather than continued voyages to the West Indies, some to Virginia, and he later invested in the China and India trades, which were further developed by his sons.

Following his active business career, John Heard became more involved in politics and was elected to the Massachusetts House of Representatives from Ipswich as a Federalist in 1788 and again in 1792 and 1793. He was defeated for re-election in 1794 and 1795, but in the latter year was moderator of the town meeting and in 1796 was elected as selectman. In 1803, he was elected to the State Senate where he continued until 1811. Meanwhile, he had been appointed as a justice of the peace by Governor Increase Sumner on 22 February 1799; and in 1814 was appointed as a sessions justice of the Court of Common Pleas for Essex County, on which he served until 1820.

His final years in retirement were spent in Ipswich. Between 1795 and 1800 he built a large Federal-style mansion on the site of the old Calef homestead. It was also about this time that Gilbert Stuart painted his portrait, which hung in the house at Ipswich until about 1925 when it was purchased by a descendant, Grafton Winthrop Minot. In its place today is a copy by another descendant, Alice Leeds "Elsie" Heard. The original portrait was later sold by Hirschl & Adler Galleries in New York and was eventually purchased by Mr. and Mrs. J. William Middendorf. It was exhibited at Blair House in Washington, D.C., 1970-1973, and in 1983 was sold by Sotheby Parke Bernet, Inc., of New York. It is now in a private collection in Wisconsin.

The Ipswich mansion remained in the family until 1936 when it was sold to the Ipswich Historical Society, which now uses the John Heard House as its headquarters and as a museum of Federal-style living and of the China Trade era.

Aside from the mansion house on South Main Street, John Heard also invested in Ipswich real estate, including a farm at Jeffries Neck, which eventually consisted of sixty acres of upland and forty acres of marsh. There was also an investment in the purchase of the Swasey Tavern, which was later transferred to his son Augustine on 14 April 1823 (unrecorded deed at the Ipswich Historical Society). The Turkey Shore Distillery, as it was later known, was transferred to his youngest son, George W. Heard, on 10 February 1818, ending an almost fifty-year connection with that business. There were also other real estate dealings outside of Ipswich -- in Boston, at Hallowell, Maine, and in the Ohio territory as an investor in the Ohio Company and Associates (Heard Collection, vol. AM-1).

 - He entered Phillips Exeter Academy in 1799, but it does not appear that he was graduated from that institution. In 1803 he was in the employ of Ebenezer Francis, one of the principal merchants of Boston, and in his twentieth year, 1805, he sailed to Calcutta as supercargo of a merchant vessel belonging to his employer. He was absent two years on this voyage. He continued to go to sea, and on 18 Feb. 1812, in the brig

Caravan, he sailed for the first time as master, being both master and supercargo. On this voyage eighty thousand dollars in cargo and treasure were entrusted to his care. His skill as a navigator and success as a merchant were of such a high order that he soon became one of the foremost captains in the East-India trade, and he had the choice of some of the best ships trading with the Orient.

Mr. Heard had been able to build up a comfortable fortune through his numerous ventures, and in 1829 he completed his active sea career. On 7 June 1830, while in his forty-sixth year, he sailed for Canton, China, to become a partner in the famous firm of Samuel Russell & Company, in which he had a three-sixteenths interest. His work was marked with success, but being in bad health he returned to America in 1834 at the end of his term. He then settled in Boston, from which oity he directed his business and investments. Owing to internal friction, Russell & Company was reorganized in 1840, and the new firm of Augustine Heard & Company was established with Joseph Coolidge. formerly of Russell & Company, as the active partner in Canton. The Opium War was in progress when Heard arrived, and during the period of hostilities his place of business was attacked by a mob which caused him serious loss, although his coolness and fearlessness enable him to save a large share of his goods and specie. Later he was compensated for his loss by the Chinese government. Carrying on the general merchant and commission business common to the China merchants of his day, he had the confidence and respect of the Chinese, as well as of his competitors and employees. In contrast to the sharp practices of the small firms, he maintained high standards of business in conjunction with the few large houses at Canton. With those of Samuel Russell, D. W. C. Olyphant and W. S. Wetmore, his firm was one of the four to survive the competition of decades at Canton. In that highly individualistic period of American foreign policy, it had an important influence in shaping the Far Eastern policy, it had an important influence in shaping the Far Eastern policy of his government. Mr. Heard returned to America in 1844 and never again went to China, although he made several trips to Europe.

Each of his four nephews, however, served their turn as manager of the firm in China. As long as Mr. Heard lived, the business prospered, but after the Civil War in this country it suffered from the same conditions that affected all American firms in the Orient. After returning to this country, Mr. Heard settled at Ipswich in the mansion of his late father which he furnished with a large number of costly and elegant mementos of his time in the Orient. The paintings included a large number of Chinese port scenes, clipper ships and other paintings by the noted artist George Chinnery; these paintings were purchased by the Peabody Museum, Salem, Mass., from the Heard estate in 1931 and 1937. The Museum also holds a portrait of Augustine Heard painted by William Morris Hunt, a copy of which is in the Ipswich Public Library. In 1828 with his brother, G. W. Heard, and Joseph Farley he incorporated the Ipswich Manufacturing Company and in 1852 became sole owner. He founded and endowed the Ipswich Public Library, providing the library with the building that it is still (1995) using. In 1916 the Ipswich Historical Society published a book by Thomas Franklin Waters entitled *Augustine Heard and His* Friends, which gives a detailed account of Mr. Heard's personal and business life. An account of the business, Augustine Heard and Company, 1858-1862, by Stephen C.

He was also the jailkeeper from 1798 to 1824 for the town of Worcester. Amos Heard served in Capt. Thomas Burnham's Company, which marched on the alarm of 19 April 1775, serving three days; he later served under Capt. Richard Peabody in Col. Edward Wigglesworth's Regiment; Capt. John Dodge's company, Col. Jacob Gerrish's Regiment and Capt. Joseph Hodgkins in Col. Timothy Bigelow's Regiment; his companies were engaged in the Battle of Fort Ticonderoga and served as guards for General Burgoyne's surrenedered army; he enlisted in Capt. Hodgkins's company of the Massachusetts Line in July 1778 and was discharged in April 1779 at Providence, R.I., having been present with that company at the Battle

On 17 Feb. 1780 Samuel Thing Gilman, yeoman of Exeter, and Sarah his wife, sold for £21:13:4 to Samuel Heard of Ipswich, cordwainer, "one undivided half part of the southwest half of a certain dwelling house scituate in Ipswich aforesaid and one undivided half part of half the cellar under the other end of said house with one undivided half of the westerly half of a barn standing near said dwelling house and one undivided half of a quarter and half a quarter of an acre of land... under and adjoining said half house bounded as follows beginning at the street and thence northwest by land of John Heard, jr., northeast by heirs of Nathaniel Perley, deceased, southeast by Perley's heirs and Samuel Heard to the street, thence southwest to bounds first mentioned" (Essex Deeds 138:75). Her sister Esther, with husband Joseph Waitt of Brunswick, Vermont, yeoman, likewise sold "one undivided half part" to Samuel Heard, and Joseph Fowler yeoman of Ipswich and Esther, his wife, released the latter's right of dower in the above described premises, 14 Feb. 1783 (Essex Deeds 140:216).

After their marriage, they moved from Exeter to Northfield, N.H., where he was a selectman and held other offices. In 1804 they moved to Stanstead, Lower Canada (now Province of Quebec), just over the Vermont border and settled on No. 6, 7th Range on the road from Mack's Mills to the highway between Beebe and Griffin. Samuel T. Gilman drew a U.S. Revolutionary pension from 4 March 1831 until his death in 1841. His widow received a pension based on this service from 1848 until her death in 1855

¹ Rachel Workman, the daughter of Dr William Hunter and Fanny (Bullock) Workman, was born at Worcester, Mass., 22 March 1884, and died in Scotland, Sept. 1958. She married 7 July 1911, as his second wife, Sir Alexander MacRobert, who was born 21 May 1854 and died 22 June 1922, the son of John and Helen (Collie) MacRobert of Douneside, Aberdeenshire, Scotland.

Alexander MacRobert was president of the Upper Indian Chamber of Commerce, 1898-1908; honorary colonel late lieutenant colonel, Cawnpore Volunteer Rifles; M.L.C., United Provinces of Agra and Oudh, 1900-1908. He was created a knight in 1910, made Knight of the British Empire (K.B.E.) in 1919, and raised to the nobility as a baronet, 5 April 1922. He was also LL.D., Aberdeen, V.C., Fellow of the University of Allahad, and Governor of the Agricultural College at Cawnpore.

Lady MacRobert was educated at the Royal Holloway College, Edinburgh University, the Imperial College of Science, and the University of London. She was a member of the International Council of Women, a fellow of geological societies in London, Edinburgh, Glasgow, Sweden, and the Mineral Society of London. She was also a director of the Scottish Chamber of Agriculture, and a breeder of pedigreed Friesian cattle, for which she was winner of the supreme championship of the Highland Agricultural Society show in 1920 and 1921. Their summer home was at Douneside, Tarland, Aberdeenshire, Scotland, and their winter home at Colney Park, St. Albans, Hertfordshire, England.

Dr. Workman attended Hopkins Academy in Hadley and in 1822 began to study medicine with Dr. Seth Washburn of Greenfield and the same year became a student at Harvard Medical School, where he graduated M.D. in 1825. For ten years he practiced in Shrewsbury, and in 1835 moved to Worcester, where he continued his medical practice for fifty years. He was active in professional circles as a contributor to the *Boston Medical and Surgical Journal*; a member of the Massachusetts Medical Society from 1831 and on its council from 1840 to 1864; a frequent delegate to the national meetings of the American Medical Association; and as a member of the Worcester District Medical Society and the Worcester Medical Improvement Society.

In addition to his professional obligations, Dr. Workman was also active in civic affairs as a member of the school committee for the Center district from 1840 to 1850, an early member of the Worcester County Horticultural Society, president of the Lyceum Society, a trustee of the Worcester County Institution for Savings from 1848 to 1873, and director of the People's Insurance Company from 1860 to 1872. In 1862 he was appointed by Governor Andrew as a trustee of the Worcester Lunatic Hospital, which appointment was renewed in 1867. During the Civil War, although already sixty-four years old, he volunteered his services and went to Fortress Monroe as surgeon in charge of a transport. At the age of seventy, Dr. Workman retired from active practice although he continued to consult on medical matters (Charles Nutt, *History of Worcester and Its People*, 4 vols. [New York, 1919], 3:20).

The three MacRobert sons were all pilots in the Royal Air Force, and the two younger sons lost their lives in the service. The bomber, a Stirling, took part in many raids on the enemy.

46. EDMUND⁶ HEARD (Edmund⁵⁻⁴⁻³⁻², Luke¹) was born at Worcester [Lancaster, family register], Mass., 16 [17, family register] Feb. 1768, and died 7 Feb. 1830 (g.s.; S. A. Hurd gives 10 Feb. 1830 at Newport, L.C.). He married at Lancaster, Mass., 25 Nov. 1792 (S.A. Hurd gives 22 Nov.) LUCY BENNETT, who was born 5 Jan. 1774 (ibid.), and died 3 June 1845, aged 71 (g.s.), daughter of John⁵ (John⁴⁻³, Samuel², George¹) and Lucy (Phelps) Bennett (Ethel Stanwood Bolton, "The Bennetts of Lancaster, Mass.," *New England Historical and Genealogical Register* 56[1902]:245). Both are buried in Maple Leaf Cemetery, Randboro, Newport Township, Que.

Edmund Heard was created a first sergeant in Capt. Ezra Sawyer's company of cavalry on 14 Aug. 1792 at Lancaster, Mass. (The certificate, signed by his father Edmund⁵ is in the possession of E. Lionel Hurd, Sawyerville, Que., 1985). On 3 Oct. 1846 Edmund Heard, John Bennet Heard and Luke Heard of Newport and Tyler W. Heard and Samuel A. Heard of Eaton and Lucy Heard, wife of George Gibson of Melbourne, in the province of Sherbrooke, heirs of Lucy Bennett, wife of Edmund Heard, late of Newport, formerly of Lancaster, sold to Dr. Calvin Carter of Lancaster a 15-acre tract of land in Lancaster, Mass. Heard and others as heirs of Lucy Bennett Hurd, late of Lancaster, Mass., sold to Charles Eaton of Lancaster, a piece of land in Lancaster, 9 March 1853. The deed was also signed by Samuel A. Hurd, Lucy Heard and Sarah Heard (Worcester County Deeds, 505:100). Luke Heard, Tyler W. Heard; Samuel A. Heard; John Augustus Heard; Polly Heard, widow of the late John B. - 47. LUKE⁶ HEARD (Edmund⁵⁻⁴⁻³⁻², Luke¹) was born at Worcester, Mass., 22 March 1770, and

drowned 30 July 1808 at Wells bar, Kennebunk, Maine, with John Larrabee, while on a fishing excursion (Samuel A. Hurd family record). He married first at Salem, Mass., 14 March 1790 MARY "POLLY" EMMERTON, who died at Salem (VR), 24 Aug. 1802, aged 33. He married second at Portland, Maine (VR), 28 Nov 1802 HANNAH HANOVER of Portland.

Luke Heard was apprentice to B. Cheever, cordwainer of Salem, on 3 April 1789 when he joined a singing school, first held at the home of Rev. William Bentley (*The Diary of William Bentley, D. D., Pastor of the East Church, Salem, Massachusetts*, 4 vols. Salem, Mass., 1905-1914, 1:5, 119, 121, 136, 175). He was probably the Luke Hurd listed in the 1790 census at Watertown, Mass., with a household consisting of one male over sixteen; two males under sixteen and one female. On 12 Feb. 1793 "Luke Heard and family, among others, [were] warned by Selectmen to depart limits of town of Braintree," Mass. He was back in Salem by 22 March when he was again mentioned among the musicians at Rev. Bentley's (*Diary of William Bentley*, 2:175). He was listed in the 1800 census at Salem, Mass., and probably removed to Kennebunk, Maine in 1802.

The following extracts are taken from a letter, dated Portland, Maine, 7 January 1803, from Luke Heard to his brother (probably Samuel) in Canada: "...I Recived a Letter from you dated Last September th 19 and Recivd it at portland the Letter was directed to me at Salem but previous to the date of said letter I was obliged to leave Sallem on accoumpt of my Credottors runing on me all at the opportunity when I could not pay them, after being at a grate Expence in Sickness and brought down very low after loosing my wife Sum of my Credettors by the advice of my grate Friend Emmonton would not give me Eny time to put myself in Business so as to pay them, so I thought it was my best way to leave the Town and let them take my House and Contence and make the best of them thay could... I am in good business in portland to Worke for my worke at my Trade and have maried the Wooman that Long Ceep my House and toock Care of my wife..." (Original letter in collection of E. Lionel Hurd, Sawyerville, Que., 1985). Another letter from the same collection is addressed to Samuel Heard, Newport, Lower Canada, and dated 31 July 1808 from Kennebunk, District of Maine:

My dear Brother

A painful task devolves on me - a task I did ever deprecate, but which misfortune has imposed. On the day before yesterday about 4 p.m. my Husband, Edmund (sic), who returned about three weeks since, and a young man of the neighborhood attempted to go a fishing in an open boat, such as often used for the purpose here; before the next morning, however, a violent storm oame on, unable to return 'till daylight appeared, they were obliged to ride it out until that time, when they endea- voured like many other boats to gain Wells harbour, it being just under their lee; but when on the bar the boat filled, and they sought safety by swimming but Oh! my brother, with the most accute pain I tell you, my Husband was unable to gain the shore where liv'd his now disconsolate widow, endeared to him by her little pratling, Martha, and a babe at the breast: joined by the most tender ties of conjugal affection; judge of my grief; and judge of my situation, left without a sufficiency for myself, or my little innocents, in a place where we have liv'd but a short time, without connections on my side, of whom to expect relief. I look up to the family of my Husband, and beg of you, not support, but only to come down and see me, as soon as feassible: but if absolutely

impossible, I earnestly request you to write to me without delay; until then I trust to the mercies of Heav'n. I know the love you bore to your deceased Brother, and the friendship you have professed for me, together with what I have already informed you will be sufficient inducement without saying more. Edmund sends his respects to you, and your family, with a request that you would remember him to all his friends there. Pray give my most sincere love, and respects, to your worthy consort, and all my friends. Your ever affectionate Sister (per request of) Hannah Heard Saml Silsbee

P.S. For your information - Kennebunk is situated on the Post road 25 miles west of Portland.

61. CHESTER⁶ HURD (William⁵, Edmund⁴⁻³⁻², Luke¹) was born in Sept. 1807 (6 Sept. 1806 per Bible record); and died at Barnston, Que., 3 Sept. 1887 (g.s., or 1897, Bible record). He married HANNAH ELVIRA CARR, who died 17 March 1880 in her 70th year; both are buried in Massiwippi Cemetery, Que.

He was a Free-Will Baptist minister who preached at North Hatley, Quebec. "On his sixteenth birthday, through the earnest prayers and entreaty of a sister and a cousin, Chester knelt alone in the woods by the side of a hemlock stump, and began his first prayer; but 'O Lord' was all he could say, there was such a feeling of his lost condition. He turned to the Bible for comfort and finding peace, he erected the family altar and began religious work in town. This was the beginning of a revival that continued for years. Converted in September, 1822, he was licensed in September, 1841. He could not accept the doctrine of the only church, the Calvinistic Baptist, in his vicinity. Finding himself in accord with the teaching of the Free Baptist Treatise, he was ordained in September 1842, by a council consisting of Rev's Zebina Young, Steadman Cummings, Stephen Leavitt, Willard Bartlett, and O. Shipman. "He soon entered upon a pastorate of forty years with the Hatley church" (*Free Will Baptist Encyclopedia*, 258-258). In 1842, "soon after his arrival several were added to the Church, but a dark day came, Millerism shook the Free-will Baptist Church to its foundation. Though young in the ministry, Mr. Heard sustained his position with a discrimination above his years, and had lived to realize the fruit of his labors in the comparative restoration of the Church in Hatley to its primitive state" (B. F.

Hubbard, Forests and Clearings: The History of Stanstead County, Province of Quebec [Montreal, 1874], 100). "He toiled for his support on the homestead, at the shoe-bench, and at times at teaching. He settled many estates, among the number the Taylor-Litte estate, from which the Home Mission Society has a yearly allowance. He was an earnest supporter of all our missionary interests and a firm friend of our denomination.... He was presented at the General Conference at Weir's, N.H., in 1880" (Free Will Baptist Encyclopedia, 258). His wife "was an excellent wife, and having a family of sweet singers, the home became a gathering-place for religious song, and hospitality abounded to friends of the cross of Christ" (ibid.).

The petition of David Little presented to the legislature, 12 Oct. 1812, is typical of others from the town. Mr. Little was asking for reimbursement for time and money spent in pursuing two horse thieves who were caught, tried before Justice Dennison Cooke, and convicted. Little petitioned "that he is poor and unable to bear the whole cost and expense that he has been at in proving and detecting said thieves and as it was for the benefit of the government as well as for the benefit of your petitioner that said thieves should be pursued and detected and as the government by means of the exertions of your honor's petitioner has received and will receive more than a complete indemnity for all costs that the State has sustained, your Honor's petitioner prays your honorable body to take his case into his wise consideration and to allow him the whole or a part of the sums he has so expended or from the same as you in your wisdom may judge right" (Anna L. Mower, *History of Morristown, Vermont* [1935], 285).

71. JOHN⁶ HEARD (William⁵⁻⁴, Nathaniel³, Edmund², Luke¹) was born 6 April 1779, and died at Belfast, Maine, 4 March 1859. He married 13 Dec. 1807, his first cousin LUCY⁶ HEARD, who was born at Vinalhaven, Maine, 1 Dec. 1785, and died at Swanville, Maine, 10 Oct. 1852, daughter of James⁵ (William⁴, Nathaniel³, Edmund², Luke¹) and Elizabeth (Hodgkins) Heard.

John Heard and his father William bought 100 acres of land at "Oakhill," Swanville, Me., for \$700. John sold this land after his father's death, 3 May 1809, to Robert Bucklin for \$800 (Hancock County, Me., Deeds, 25:333). The same day, 3 May 1809, John bought 100 acres of land with house and barn, Lot #10 in the Waldo Division of Lands at Camden (now Rockport) for \$2000 from Robert Bucklin (Knox County, Me., Deeds, 13:224). They probably lived on this land until 13 Nov. 1817, when they sold the land (ibid., 18:411) and moved to Swanville. John also had an interest in a piece of land and a sawmill located on "Goose River" in what is now Rockport, Me. This mill was apparently located on the river just north of the Amsbury Cemetery. They were not on the 1818 "List of Inhabitants of Swanville" but were listed there in the 1820 federal census. At about the time of their move to Swanville, the family adopted the spelling "Hurd" for their surname. Between 1819 and 1842, John Hurd was quite involved in the highway surveying and school agent departments for District no 9.

He later returned to Ash Point to sell his share of his mother's dower rights in his father's estate. When the land was divided among the children, John's share amounted to six and a half acres and was valued at \$100, but on 5 July 1844 he sold his portion for \$20 (Knox Co. Deeds, 8:364). The 1850 census of Swanville shows that John had 43 acres of improved land and 43 acres of unimproved land which was valued at \$300; they also had 2 cows and 4 oxen valued at \$120, and also had six bushels of Indian corn.

Moses Heard served in the War of 1812 as a private in Capt. A. G. Coombs' company, Lt. Col. E. Foote's Regiment, serving at Thomaston and Camden from 22 June to 26 June and again 20 September to 25 September 1814 (*Mass. Militia in the War of 1812- 14*, 197, 204). Moses was a farmer and lived on what is today the Lucia Beach Road at Ash Point. Their home, possibly the oldest house surviving there in 1982, has a mini-ball imbedded in the house, probably from the War of 1812 period. Robert Heard was a farmer and lived at Ash Point, just north of the home "Otis Villa," built by a descendant, Alvin Hurd. The 1860 census of South Thomaston listed the following in the household of Robert Heard, 68, farmer; Elizabeth Heard, 64; Luther H. Heard, 26, mariner; Jane Heard, 22, b. in England; Jennie E. (VR), 10 July 1871 (death notice in the *Saturday Chronicle*, Charlestown, 15 July 1871, gives her age as 91 yrs., 21 days; the *Charlestown Advertiser*, 15 July 1871, gives 91 yrs., 29 days), the daughter of Jeremiah and Elizabeth Bean. Both were buried in the "New Cemetery," which is probably the burying ground on Bunker Hill St., Charlestown. No stone or burial register has been located.

James Heard served briefly during the War of 1812 as a private in several Wiscasset, Maine, companies of the Massachusetts Militia, including Capt. A. Potter's Company, Lt. Col. E. Cutter's

Regiment, which saw service at Wiscasset and Boothbay. They resided at New Sharon and Wiscasset, Maine, and shortly after 1830 moved to Charlestown, Mass. It was about this time that the spelling of the family name changed from Heard to Hurd. James Hurd was listed on his death certificate as a real estate agent. He was a deacon in the Free Will Baptist Church (death notice of his son Jason in the *Morning Star*, 11 May 1842, as cited in Young & Taylor, *Death Notices from Freewill Baptist Publications*; and in his own death notice in the *Charlestown Advertiser*, 23 Nov. 1859).

The 1850 census of Charlestown listed: James Hurd, 70, agent, b. Maine; Hannah M. Hurd, 70, b. Maine; Sarah E. Hatch, 3, b. Mass. The 1855 census of Charlestown listed: James Hurd, 75, carpenter, b. Maine; Hannah Hurd, 75, b. Maine; Sarah E. Hatch, 8, b. Mass.; and Elsey Day, 42, b. Maine.

On 27 Feb. 1857, James Hurd, gentleman of Charlestown, mortgaged to William Hurd, morocco dresser of Stoneham, for \$300 a parcel of land with building in Charlestown on Elm Street, being the same conveyed to him by Thomas P. James, as recorded in Middlesex Deeds, 493:287 (ibid., 751:555). Hannah Hurd applied for a pension base on her husband's War of 1812 service, 29 April 1871, but the petition was rejected 17 Dec. 1872 "for want of proof of service & presumptive abandonment of the claim" (National Archives. Military Records Service. W.0.-2751).

The widow Elizabeth Stone resided at Boston, Mass., 20 Sept. 1845, when she signed a quitclaim deed with her brother Daniel deeding their rights to the real estate of their father to Samuel Dam of Newfield (York Deeds 203:307); their brother William quiclaimed his right, 13 Oct. 1841 (ibid., 212:1), and brother James Hurd of Charlestown, Mass., sold on 12 Nov. 1851 land he had inherited from his father plus that which he purchased 2 Nov. 1841 from John Hurd and wife of Swanville (ibid., 203:205).

Julia A.V. Reed was appointed administratrix of her mother's estate on 16 Aug. 1880 with James M. Reed and Hannah L. Vose, both of Boston, as sureties (Suffolk Co. Probate, file 64602).

He may have married second Elsa ----, who was listed with him in the Stow 1860 census, aged 46. Both are buried in Stow Corner Cemetery, Stow, Me.

Thomas Day moved to Newfield, Me., with his parents in 1788. He and Mary were listed in the 1810 census of Newfield without any children. In an 1812 deed he was a joiner of Newfield when he bought ten acres there. In an 1819 deed he was a joiner of Baldwin, Me., selling the above ten acres to his father. His wife was called Polly in that deed. From there he went to Chatham, N.H., and then between 1838 and 1841 to Stow, Me. He was of Stow on the latter date when he and his wife signed quitclaim rights to her father's real estate (Ruth Bridges Ayer, *Early Families of Newfield, Maine* [Gorham, Me., 1995], 172-173).

He married first at Waterborough, Me., 26 Nov. 1812 ELIZABETH HAYNES of Waterborough, who was born 29 Aug. 1791, and died 15 Aug. 1826 (g.s.; Newfield VR gives 15 Dec. 1826; rec. in the *Morning Star*, 21 Dec. 1826). They are both buried in the family cemetery, Newfield, Me. He married second at Wakefield, N.H. (VR), 15 July 1828 ELIZA FRENCH, who was born 3 Feb. 1799. She married second at Newfield, 28 April 1840 (VR) Winthrop Hill, and died at Newfield, 14 Dec. 1843.

"Under the call made for soldiers to defend the coast of Maine (War of 1812), five men were drafted from each company of the regiment of militia in the northern part of York County, and Capt. Ayer, the senior captain of the regiment, marched with them to Kittery." Among the draftees was John Heard (*History of York County, Maine*, 2:353). His name appears as a private on the muster lists of Capt. James Ayer's Company of Massachusetts Detached Militia in the Regiment commanded by Maj. Simon Nowell, dated 31 Oct. and 9 Nov. 1814, Kittery Point, showing him enlisted on 29 Sept. 1814 for a period of three months. In a company pay roll for Oct. and Nov. 1814, his expiration of service is shown as 17 Nov. 1814 having commenced service on 8 Oct. 1814, for which he received a total of \$12.18 pay, including travel home (Military Records Service, National Archives, Washington, D.C.). He was called captain in his death notice in the *Morning Star*, 17 Aug. 1832.

He died intestate and his widow applied for the widow's allowance mentioning that she had eight minor children to support (York Co. Probate, no. 8970). The minor children were placed under the guardianship of Dominicus Ricker of Parsonfield, Me., 7 Oct. 1833 (ibid., no. 8939). On 28 May 1836 Dominicus Ricker of Parsonfield, as guardian to Daniel, James, Lydia, Nancy, Elijah and Betsey Heard, minors, sold to the highest bidder, Nathaniel Libby of Newfield, Me., for \$458.50, land and a house in Newfield which was bounded by land conveyed by William Heard to James Heard (York Deeds, 179:256). This is probably the house shown on an 1856 map of Newfield as belonging to a Mrs. Libby, and which was located next to the brook near the Heard family cemetery. That house no longer exists.

He married second 26 June 1828 his first cousin MERCY DAY, who was born at Newfield, 20 Oct. 1799, and died at Athens, Me., 24 June 1881, daughter of Thomas and Lucy (Hodgkins) Day. William and Mercy are buried in Libby Cemetery, Harmony, Me.

His will, made 18 June 1844, mentions Ann Hannah Benson Dennett and his sister Abigail Kimball, wife of Luther Kimball; left bulk of estate to wife Hannah "in consideration of her laborious services kind attentions and tender treatment of myself and the dear children I have buried . . ."; real estate consisted of Garden lot and barn on West side 2d street, \$500; house and land on East side 2d Street, \$600; 1 share in Boilston Market Boston, \$100; an Interst held in a farm in old Welles, \$100; total included notes and personal estate, \$2768.20 (Kennebec Co., Maine, Probate H6). His widow, Hannah Heard, made her will 15 Oct. 1849, leaving her entire estate to a niece, Ann B. H. Dennett, who later married N. R. Burnett of Morrisania, N.Y. (ibid., H15).

He was sent to Dartmouth College by his maternal grandfather and graduated with the Class of 1815 (George Thomas Chapman, *Sketches of the Alumni of Dartmouth College* [Cambridge, Mass., 1867]; see also the Heard Collection, Baker Library, vol. AO-6).

85. JOHN⁶ HEARD (John⁵, Daniel⁴⁻³, Edmund², Luke¹) was born at Ipswich, Mass., 12 Jan. 1775, and was buried in King's Chapel, Boston, 26 May 1839. He married at King's Chapel, Boston, Mass. (VR), 30 Oct. 1804 SUSAN OLIVER, who was born at Boston, 11 Aug. 1780, and died at Belmont, Mass., 16 Oct. 1863, daughter of Ebenezer and Susannah (Johonnot) Oliver.

John Heard graduated from Harvard College in the Class of 1795. He joined the Suffolk Bar in 1796 and practiced law in Boston from an office at 98 Court Street. He served as a member of the Boston School Committee annually from 1806 to 1816. In the 1811 election for senator from Suffolk County, he (along with twenty-six others) received one vote in an election which went to Harrison Gray Otis. He resided in Boston where he was appointed judge of probate for Suffolk County on 15 March 1836. He was succeeded in that post by Willard Phillips, 3 May 1839.

John Heard of Boston, counsellor at law, made his will 23 May 1839 (probated 27 May 1839). He left to his grandson and namesake John Heard Griswold, one thousand dollars; and to his brother George W. Heard, fifteen thousand dollars in trust for his daughter Ann Griswold, "for her support & maintenance during her life"; to his wife Susan, "all my household furniture, goods, plate, pictures, & stores in my houses in the City and at Watertown of every description, together with all my books, including my law library, with my horses, carriages, of all kinds, and the stock, farming and other utensils at Watertown, and all other things used therewith," plus the lifetime income from all his real and personal estate not otherwise distributed in this will. Upon the death of his wife, one third of the estate was to go to his daughter Susan; one third in trust to his brother George on behalf of his daughter Frances Maria Winthrop; and the remaining third to the children of his daughter Ann. His wife Susan and brother Augustine were appointed joint executors (Suffolk Probate, file 32169). The inventory of the real estate listed various property in Boston including the "Brick Mansion House & out buildings, corner of Walnut & Mt. Vernon Streets," commercial and residential property throughout the city, particularly in South Boston, plus the farm at Watertown. The estate consisted of \$132,837.00 in real estate, plus \$82,282.89 in personal estate.

86. MARGARET⁶ "PEGGY" HEARD (John⁵, Daniel⁴⁻³, Edmund², Luke¹) was born at Ipswich, Mass., 26 Aug. 1783, and died there, 13 Aug. 1829. She married at Ipswich (VR), 24 May 1807 Dr. THOMAS MANNING, who was born at Ipswich, 7 Feb. 1775, and died there, 3 Feb. 1854, son of Dr. John⁴ (Joseph³, Thomas², Richard¹) and Lucy (Bolles) Manning.

Dr. Thomas Manning was among the progressive members of his profession and the first doctor to introduce the innoculation for kine pox in his vicinity, his experiments, being completely satisfactory; he also served as surgeon of the Second Regiment, 2d Brigade, State Militia, and as a justice of the peace; by his will, the doctor left a large sum of money to found the Manning School at Ipswich, and this, under his nephew, Richard H. Manning, and others, became an established and highly successful institution (William H. Manning, *The Manning Family*, pp. 734, 736).

87. HANNAH STANIFORD⁶ HEARD (John⁵, Daniel⁴⁻³, Edmund², Luke¹) was born at Ipswich, Mass., 3 June 1789, and died 28 June 1824. She married at Ipswich (VR), 26 Jan. 1819 SIDNEY WILLARD, who was born at Beverly, Mass., 19 Sept. 1780, and died 6 Dec. 1856, the son of Joseph⁵ (Samuel⁴, John³, Samuel², Simon¹) and Mary (Sheafe) Willard. His first wife was Elizabeth Ann Andrews, the daughter of Joanna (Heard) Andrews and niece of Hannah S. Heard.

At the time of Sidney Willard's birth, his father was pastor of the First Congregational Church in Beverly, and he later became president of Harvard College, where Sidney graduated in 1798. He remained at the college as a student of theology, and, in order to relieve the financial burden of his father, he taught a district school in Waltham, Mass., during the winter of 1798-1799. In 1800 he was appointed librarian of Harvard. Approved as a preacher the following year, he supplied churches as opportunity offered and in 1802 was called to Wiscasset, Maine, but declined. In 1805 he resigned his librarianship. The following year he was engaged in preaching a part of the time in Burlington, Vermont, where he refused an invitation to settle as pastor of the Congregational Church. In December 1806 he was appointed Hancock Professor of Hebrew and Oriental languages at Harvard, which position he held for about twenty-four years. During a part of this time he also gave instruction in English and from 1827 to 1831 performed the duties of professor of Latin. He published in 1817, A Hebrew Grammar Compiled from Some of the Best Authorities. Mr. Willard was connected in one way or another with almost all the Massachusetts ventures of this period. He was one of the committee appointed by the Harvard chapter of Phi Beta Kappa in 1803 to establish and conduct a publication--project which he himself had proposed. In July 1804 the committee issued the first number of the *Literary* Miscellany, which was continued for two years. In 1807 Mr. Willard was made a member of the Anthology Society and thereafter had a hand in editing the *Monthly Anthology*. He became a contributor to the General Repository and Review and Miscellaneous Journal after its establishment in 1815. From 1818 to 1831 he occasionally wrote for the Christian Disciple, or the Christian Examiner, as in 1824 it came to be called. In 1831 he established the American Monthly Review, the first number of which appeared in January 1832. During its existence of two years under his editorship it attained considerable reputation both in the United States and in England.

In a high degree scholarly and literary, Professor Willard was not without taste and fitness for practical affairs. Before establishing the American Monthll Reliew he had resigned his professorship. The latter years of his life he was much engaged in public service. He was representative in the General Courts of Massachusetts in 1833, 1837 and 1843; state senator in 1834, 1835, 1839 and 1840; and councillor in 1837 and 1838. He served as selectman of Cambridge, and was one of the committee in 1846 that drafted the petition to the legislature for a city charter. From 1848 to 1850 he was mayor of Cambridge. He published his memoirs in two volumes entitled *Memories of Youth and Manhood* [Cambridge, Mass., 1855] in which he discussed the men and events with which he had come into contact during his life (*Dictionary of American Biography*, 20:239-40).

John Bartlett was educated in the Plymouth schools and at sixteen was employed in the University Book Store in Cambridge. This proved for him a college, as he there became a book lover and student. In 1849 he was owner of the store, which grew to be the meeting place for Harvard professors and students who cared for books. "Ask John Bartlett" was the customary advice when anyone had difficulty in finding a book or a quotation, and Bartlett was so anxious to deserve his reputation that he began keeping a commonplace-book which was the embryo of his famous Familiar Ouotations. During the Civil War he was for a few months a volunteer paymaster in the U.S. Navy. In 1863 he joined the publishing firm of Little, Brown & Co. and in 1878 became senior partner. His work there included personal dealings with authors and he made many warm friends among them especially those of the Cambridge and Concord groups. In addition to his Familiar Quotations (1855), Bartlett was the author of a New Method of Chess Notation (1857), The Shakespeare Phrase Book (1882), a Catalogue of Books on Angling, including Ichthyology, Pisciculture, Etc. (1882), a Complete Concordance to Shakespeare's Dramatic Works and Poems (1894), with which Mrs. Bartlett gave him much assistance.

He was an ardent fisherman, and his friend James Russell Lowell commemorated a present from him in the poem "To John Bartlett, Who Had Sent Me a Seven Pound Trout." His other favorite recreation was whist; for a quarter of a century he belonged to a whist club of which the other members of Lowell, Charles Choate and John Holmes, brother of 0. W. Holmes; the club was broken up by Lowell's death. *Familiar Quotations*, John Bartlett's chief accomplishment, went through nine editions during his life and a tenth edition was revised and enlarged by Nathan Haskell Dole. It contains selections from British and American authors and translations, including the Old and New Testaments. With little formal education, Bartlett yet achieved a measure of scholarship, which was recognized by the conferring upon him of an honorary M.A. degree by Harvard College and by his election to the American Academy of Arts and Sciences (*Dictionary of American Biography*, 2:6-7).

88. GEORGE WASHINGTON⁶ HEARD (John⁵, Daniel⁴⁻³, Edmund², Luke¹) was born at Ipswich, Mass., 5 Feb. 1793, and died 21 April 1863. He married at Ipswich (VR), 6 Nov. 1823 ELIZABETH ANN FARLEY, who was born at Ipswich, 20 July 1802, and died there 10 Aug. 1865, daughter of Maj. Robert and Susanna (Kendall) Farley, granddaughter of Gen. Michael Farley, who when he received LaFayette during his tour of New England, bowed so low that his wig fell off; afterwards the Marquis referred to Gen. Farley as the politest man he knew. Both are buried in the family tomb, Old North Cemetery, Ipswich.

George W. Heard graduated from Harvard College in 1812 and received his M.D. in 1815 but never practiced medicine. He lived partly in Boston but spent most of his time in Ipswich. He was school master in Ipswich in 1824 and in 1833. He served in the Massachusetts House of Representatives from Ipswich in 1826, 1830, 1831 and 1833. He was a partner in the Ipswich Manufacturing Company with his brother Augustine and was also the first president of the Ipswich Bank which was established in 1833.

George W. Heard of Ipswich, merchant, made his will on 27 Dec. 1862 (proved 5 May 1863), leaving the use, income and improvement of all his estate to his wife Elizabeth Ann for life. "Whereas my brother Augustine Heard in the conveyance to me of all his right in the mansion and homestead of our honored father John Heard and the land adjoining the same has expressed his wish that said estate should be transferred, after the decease of myself and my wife, to my oldest son, John Heard, therefore in full and cheerful compliance with that wish as well as in accordance with my own desire, I give and devise to my said oldest son John, after the decease of my wife, all my share and estate in the said mansion and homestead and all my lands adjoining the same and upon the other side of the street in front of said mansino, to have and to hold the same during his life, And upon his decease I give and devise all the said real estate to my sons Augustine, Albert F. and George F. and to the survivor of them for life." The balance of his estate he bequeathed equally to his four sons who were named as co-executors (Essex Probate, 422:327).

Elizabeth Ann Heard made her will 15 Sept. 1863 (proved 3 Oct. 1865). She left to her son Albert Farley Heard, "now of Victoria in the colony of Hong Kong, merchant," her share to "one undivided half share or moiety of the piece of land and premises situate within the limits of the Foreign Concession at Shanghai in the Empire of China, registered at the Russian Consulate at Shanghai aforesaid as Lot number one and containing in the whole by Chinese measurement Ten Maw and Five Fun." The balance of her estate she left equally in shares to her four sons who were all to serve as executors (Essex Probate, 424:32).

Two sets of portraits of George W. and Elizabeth A. (Farley) Heard -- one by William Morris Hunt and the other by Samuel Goodhue -- hang in the John Heard House, Ipswich.

obliged to return to China again in 1872, he remained there until 1875; in 1877 he represented the Lowell Gun Company in Russia, and it was probably about this period that he was the official representative from China to Russia for several years; from 1880 to 1882 he was manager of a metallurgical foundry in Bayonne, France; he later removed to Washington, D.C., where he served as private secretary to William C. Endicott, Secretary of War, and later as librarian for the Army. Mr. Heard became interested in the history of the Russian Orthodox Church and published a book on the subject, *The Russian Church and Russian Dissent* (New York: Harper & Brothers, 1889). No children.

George W. Heard spent his boyhood in Ipswich, Derry and Exeter, in all which places he attended school; he entered Harvard College but completed his formal education at Geneva, Switzerland; in 1859 he went to China as private secretary to the American delegation at the negotiation of the Treaty of Tientsin; he was present with Mr. Ward, the American minister to China, at the attack of the Peiho forts by the English, which he described in letters home to his parents (Heard Collection, Harvard University; copies in the Peabody Essex Museum, Salem, Mass.); afterwards he joined "Augustine Heard & Co." in Canton as manager of the trading house in Canton succeeding his brothers; among his earlier accomplishments were membership in the Ancient and Honorable Artillery Company (1859) and being one of the first Americans to scale Mont Blanc, the highest mountain in France (1855); he remained with "Augustine Heard & Co." until its final collapse after which he was the last of the four brothers to leave the country. George Washington Heard, jr., merchant, petitioned 6 April 1861 (granted 13 May 1861) for his name to be changed to George Farley Heard, giving the reason as: "There are

for his name to be changed to George Farley Heard, giving the reason as: "There are several persons in said Boston whose middle name commences with the same letter as that of your petitioner thereby causing great trouble and inconvenience to your petitioner in the reception of letters & otherwise." (Suffolk Co. Probate).

89. NANCY⁶ HEARD (Nathan⁵, Daniel⁴⁻³, Edmund², Luke¹) was born at Worcester, Mass., 21 May 1786, died 24 June 1818, and was buried in the old Mechanic St. Cemetery, Worcester. She married at Worcester, 3 April 1815 Capt. LEONARD CLARK, who was born at Hubbardston, Mass. He married second, 4 April 1819 Eunice Gleason and had further issue.

He went to Worcester as a young man and established a general store on Burncoat Street, in what is now Adams Square; lived at Rutland, 1829-1832, then returned to Worcester. He later moved to Shrewsbury and was a captain in the state militia (Nutt, *History of Worcester County*, 3:303).

He married first 31 Oct. 1813 RUTH HOLLIS, who was born at Braintree, Mass., 5 June 1789, and died 5 June 1817, buried Elm Street Cemetery, Braintree, daughter of Capt. Thomas⁴ (Thomas³, John²⁻¹) and Lydia (Holbrook) Hollis. He married second at Weymouth, Mass., 24 March 1819 (VR) RACHEL WHITE, who was born at Weymouth, 23 April 1798 (VR), and died at Worcester (VR), 16 Jan. 1887, daughter of Nathaniel⁶ (Nathaniel⁵⁻⁴, Thomas³, Ebenezer², Thomas¹) and Polly (Hollis) White.

Nathan Heard was long associated with the United States Army and passed through all grades of military promotion from corporal to major-general. He was second lieutenant of the company of Worcester Artillery (with Capt. Samuel Graves and First Lieutenant Simeon Hastings) who marched from Worcester for Boston, on Sunday, 14 Sept. 1814, under orders from Governor Caleb Strong, during the then war with Great Britain. He was later a grocer in the firms of Heard & Manning and Heard & Rice. He was for a long time overseer of the jail and House of Correction at Worcester after he had resigned from the position of jailor. Mr. Heard was representative in the General Court of Massachusetts (1838, 1839, 1840) and chief engineer of the Worcester Fire Department from 1837 to 1840, and occupied other prominent positions (Charles Nutt, *History of Worcester County and Its People* [New York, 1919], 1:148). His widow was listed in the 1880 census of Worcester in a separate household, occupation housekeeping, age 75.

John Heard 3d of Boston, gentleman, died intestate, and on 27 Dec. 1819 his widow Susan was appointed administratrix of the estate with her brother Josiah Willard, scrivener, and David Firmin, cordwainer, both of Boston, as sureties. The estate inventory totalled \$5,887.74 and included pew number 116 in the gallery of Mr. Channing's Federal Street Meeting House and a "Military Uniform & Equipments complete" (Suffolk County Probate, fil 26031). When Susan Heard died, her brother Josiah Willard, trader, was appointed administrator of her estate with David Firmin, cordwainer, and Levi Willard, trader, all of Boston, as sureties (Suffolk County Probate, file 26984). The same men were also appointed to finish the administration of John Heard's estate.

A statement dated 6 April 1824 said that widow Mary Heard had three small children (Essex Probate, file 14313). He settled at Ipswich, where he entered the employ of the Heard family as machinist in a lace factory they had established there. "Mr. Peatfield immediately went to work to repair these machines and to make improvements, and finally built a new machine which was one of the first lace machines made in this country.... Mr. Peatfield then turned his attention to other fields of manufactures, and in 1839 he inven- ted and built a warp machine, and began the manufacture of wool- lens... to James Peatfield belongs the honor of being the first person to manufacture woollen underclothing in the United States." In 1842 with his brother Sanford, he built the brick mill on Washington Street, Ipswich, and there continued the manufacture of woollen goods, hosiery and underclothing until 1877, when he retired from active business (D. Hamilton Hurd, comp.,

History of Essex County, Massachusetts [Philadelphia, 1898], 1:672-73).

He married ABIGAIL SAGE FRENCH, who was born 1811, and died 4 Aug. 1891 (g.s.), daughter of John Sage and Amy (Hall) French, who came from Connecticut to Cookshire, Que., about 1796. Both are buried in the Cookshire Cemetery, Cookshire, Que.

The 1851 census of Eaton showed Tyler Hurd possessing a one-story frame house, 300 acres (150 under cultivation, 75 under crops, 75 under pasture, 150 under wood or wild). The household (all of whom were born in Canada and were members of the Church of England) consisted of Tyler W. Hurd, farmer, 46 (all ages were noted as of next birthday); Abigail S. Hurd, 41; Sarah M. Hurd, at school, 16; John F. Hurd, at school, 14; Wellington F. Hurd, at school, 9; Cynthia Y. Hurd, at school, 7; Theodore A. Hurd, 2. The census also noted the death within the year of Leander Hurd, age 4, of lung fever.

He married 1837 CATHERINE NASH HUBBARD, who was born at Stanstead, L.C., 28 May 1816, and died 6 April 1885 (g.s.), daughter of Phineas and Catherine (Nash) Hubbard of Sunderland, Mass., and Stanstead, L.C. Both are buried in Eaton Cemetery, Eaton, Que.

Samuel A. Hurd served as chairman of the school committee for Eaton Township. He owned a farm at Eaton Corner, and was an elder in the Congregational Church at Eaton. His general merchandise store "proved a fairly successful venture. He acquired a good property, and owned much valuable real estate. He was active in town affairs, was made County Treasurer, and was Justice of the Peace for some years" (*Biographical Review, Containing Life Sketches of Leading Citizens of Essex County, Massachusetts* [Boston, 1898], 28:295-297). He compiled a manuscript family history now (1986) in the possession of E. Lionel Hurd of Sawyerville, Que. (and cited in this genealogy as "Samuel A. Hurd family rec."); and corresponded with Augustine Heard of the Ipswich branch of the family. The following is an extract from that correspondence:

I was cast upon the world without resources except what I found in my own breast, and being fond of study left home where I had enjoyed little or no priveliges for Mental improvement & commenced study with an eye to the ministry, but my health & eyes failed me and I was forced to relinquish study. I then with my brother Luke bought a small farm and I continued at that three years, and my inclination leading me to some other employment I went into a store as clerk where I served 3 years for a small salary barely enough to support myself & family, since which time I have been the acting partner in a small retail business here.... (Samuel A. Heard, Eaton, Canada East, to Augustine Heard of Ipswich, Mass., 12 July 1850, in the Heard Collection [vol. AA-1], Baker Library, Harvard University).

Since that time he had been engaged in the manufacture of paper until the beginning of his illness. For many years he was a director of the P.W. & B. Railroad Company. On the organization of the road by the consolidation of Boston capital, he was elected to the board of directors at the request of President S. M. Felton, although at that time Mr. Curtis owned no shares of its stock, and continued a director during the [Civil] War, a time when the road was a most important war route to the south. He was one of the first directors of the National Bank of Newark, president of the Casho Machine company and a trustee in Newark Academy. . ." (*The Morning News*, Wilmington, Del., 5 Nov. 1884).

Harriet Curtis, "for years Newark's Grand Old Lady, whose memory is yet green, known as 'Grandma Curtis' to so many not related to her, as well as to her grandchildren, lived to the advanced age of 94 years, and again and again entertained her family and friends by her original sayings. across the road from the mill.... Their children were gorn and grew to maturity there, but in 1892 the residence of the late Dr. Nathan H. Clark, now the residence of the President of the University of Delaware, was purchased, and there they lived the remainder of their days. The Knoll, as they called it, so long a beauty, was built by Mrs. Clark, nee Caroline Cooch" (Cooch, *Little Known History of Newark, Delaware*, 24-25).

140. WILLIAM A.⁷ HURD (John⁶, William⁵⁻⁴, Nathaniel³, Edmund², Luke¹) was born at Camden, Me., 22 April 1813, and died after 1874 and before 1887. He married at Swanville, Me., 22 April 1838 MARY ANN FRENCH, who was born at Montville, Me., 16 April 1817, and died at Lincoln, Me., 24 March 1897, daughter of John French. Her record shows her father as John tyler, and her sons' death records give their mother's maiden name as Tyler.

They resided at Swanville, Maine, for about twelve years following the marriage. The 1850

listed the household there consisting of William Hurd, 35, farmer, with real estate worth \$500; Mary A. Hurd, 33; Melvina Hurd, 10; William A. Hurd, 9; Lucy E. Hurd, 7; John Oliver Hurd, 2; and Priscilla C. Hurd 2/12. Shortly afterwards they moved to Waldo, Maine, for about three years before returning to Swanville. In 1859 they moved to Burlington, Maine, for six months, then to Lowell, Maine, for one and a half years, then to Lincoln for eighteen months and then to Enfield, Maine. He was listed in the 1860 census of Lowell as a farmer with property worth \$200.In March 1864, while living in Enfield, he left his family to work a few weeks at Mattawankeag Point. In his absence, his wife moved the fmaily to Lincoln where she established an individual household. He later lived in Enfield, Burlington, and Lincoln. Although the 1870 census of Lincoln shows: William Hurd, 57, common laborer; Mary, 53, keeping house; John O., 22, common laborer; Priscilla, 19, at home, a court case maintains that they had not lived together since 1864. In December 1871 William Hurd became sick and his brother-in-law put him on the Burlington town dole where he staved until 1 May 1872. The total cost of his care amounted to \$89.72, which the town attempted to collect from the town of Swanville, his former residence. Unable to collect the costs, the case was taken to the Supreme Judicial Court (Inhabitants of Burlington vs. Inhabitants of Swanville. State of Maine. Penobscot Ss., October term 1873, pp. 1-20), which reviewed the history of the "pauper" and his family, and awarded the verdict to the plaintiffs. The decision was appealed to the Eastern District (1874, Penobscot Co., pp. 78-86), which upheld the earlier verdict.

He married at Belfast, Me. (VR), 27 Dec. 1852 HANNAH

MATHEWS, who was born circa 1834, and was living at Knox, Me., in 1880. She married second at Knox, 1 Oct. 1871 Levi Temple (see below).

The 18 Oct. 1838 *Republican Journal* reported the following announcement under the title Freedom: "This is to give notice that I John Hurd of Swanville, in the County of Waldo and State of Maine, have given my minor son, John O. Hurd his time, - he is authorized to do business for himself, without any hindrance on my part for his wages, the same as if the said John O. was twenty one years of age. [Signed] John Hurd."

He enlisted in the Army on 14 Dec. 1863 and was mustered 21 Dec. 1863 as a private in Co. G, 19th Maine Infantry. He died in service. Hannah Hurd was awarded a Civil War widow's pension, which began at \$192 but which was reduced as the children grew older. She was later declared non compos mentis, and a guardian was appointed for her and the children. She was listed as a widow, aged 33 and daughter of James Matthews, farmer, when she registered an intention of marriage 3 Jan. 1865 with William H. Towle, seaman, 34 years, son of Theophilas and Joanna Towle; but the "Certificate [was] withheld by order of Overseers of Swanville." On 9 Jan. 1866 she registered an intention of marriage with John Shaw, widower, 45 years, laborer; but the "Certificate [was] forbidden by H. Hayford." On 22 Feb. 1869 she registered intentions with George Meriron, 24 yers, bricklayer; but again the "Certificate [was] forbidden by M. S. Staples. Guardian." She registered an intention at Morrill, Maine, 17 March 1870 with Capt. Bennajah M. Merrithew, but this likewise appears not to culminated in marriage (*Genealogical History of Morrill, Maine*). However, between the death of John O. Hurd in 1864 and her eventual remarriage in 1871, she had at least two and probably three more children. The following story appeared in the *Republican Journal*, Belfast, Maine, 12 Aug. 1869:

A PARENT WANTED

Many years ago a book was put forth bearing the singular title of "The Child of Thirty-six Fathers." We don't remember how the work solved its mysterious title, or whether it cleared up the mystery at all. But we do know that our Police Court is just now striving to solve a question almost as puzzling. Hannah Hurd of Swanville, widow of a patriot who lost his life in the late unpleasantness, lived in a family in this city. Hannah had arrived at the age of discretion, being about 35, but nevertheless was not overstocked with the article--besides being non compos and under guardianship. But notwithstanding the guardian, in an unguarded moment Hannah fell. Perhaps she got up and fell again, or became like the floating city voter, "a repeater"-- but it was not in evidence. However, she bore in her arms evidence bhat the primitive custom had been handed down and that some patriarch had at least looked upon this handmaid. It was Hagar and Ishmael over again.

Pending the threatened increase of the population of Swanville, the authorities of that steady going town became exercised about the support of the coming man, or woman, as the case might be. In order to relieve this anxiety, Hannah proposed to delcare under the solumnity of an oath, duly administered, who the patriarch aforesaid was. So, on the 5th of June, before Emery Sawyer, Esq., she kissed the book, and named F. W. Berry as the parent. It is said of Aaron Burr that he always felt complimented on similar occasions, and paid the bill without demur. But Mr. Berry denounced the affair as a swindle on him. And upon the whole Hannah

thought there was a chance for a mistake. So she sent for the same magistrate, and on June 10th corrected her testimony by bestowing the compliment on George R.Robinson. Squire Sawyer solemnly administered the oath, then took out his memorandum book, and like a base ballist, carefully scored two. But the second father was no better pleased that the first one. George swore he hadn't been within picket- shooting distance of her.

How far this roll of honor might have stretched on it is impossible to say, had it not been cut short by a complaint of Mr. Berry before the County Attorney, accusing Robinson of conspiring with Minnie E. Nash and Claribel Harvey, to injure the good name and fame of the plaintiff and to extort money by accusing him of fornication, etc. The hearing before Judge Patterson took place on Friday. All the parties were present. County Attorney Boyle appeared for the plaintiff. McLellan was counsel for respondents. Hannah and the baby were present. It wasn't like the Court that Solomon held once, to determine which claimant was mother of the child. It maybe doubted whether either of the sworn fathers would have interfered to save the young one from being made mince-meat of. There were some attempts to determine the parentage by ascertaining the family resemblance. The Court, after careful scrutiny, ventured no opinion. The counsel were pretty certain--but acted under the bias of fees, and so carried no weight. The spectators were divided on the question.

After a patient hearing of the case, and a sifting of the testimony, the Court held Robinson and Mrs. Nash, to answer the charge at the October Court. It is a queer case, and may develop some strange features at the trial. It shall be ours to modestly note themm for the information of our readers, and "nothing extenuate, nor set down aught in malice"--regretting only that linen so foul should be washed in public.

When this again came to Court, the finding was that Robinson and the others were guilty. She was listed as Mrs. Hannah Hurd of Searsmont when she registered an intention of marriage 21 Sept. 1871 at Knox, Me., with Levi Temple. They were listed in the 1880 Knox census: Levi Temple, 58, blacksmith; Hannah Temple, 48, wife, keeping house; Frank Temple, 11, son, at home.

The wind blew a gale at the time, and it is feared that the boat was capsized and sunk and that he was drowned. In fact, there cannot be much doubt of it. The only chance for hope is that he may have been picked up by an outward bound vessel, which is not at all likely. Mr. Heard was an estimable man, about 55 years of age. He leaves 5 children, all grown up, his wife has been dead some 18 years." The next week there was a retraction of the story.

He married first 10 April 1834 (int. 16 March 1833) HANNAH WEBSTER, who was born at Antrim, N.H., 12 Jan. 1812, and died at Charlestown, Mass., 17 Aug. 1843, daughter of Nathan⁶ (Nathan⁵, Jonathan⁴, Nathan³, Stephen², John¹) and Anna (Boyles) Webster of Antrim, N.H.; she was a sister of Nathan Webster who married his sister Martha R. Hurd and a first cousin of Abigail Gage Webster who married their brother Amos D. Hurd. Loammi Hurd was a carpenter and resided at Charlestown, Mass. On 14 March 1839, Loammi S. Hurd of Charlestown, carpenter, "in consideration of one dollar" granted to Jacob Hatch a parcel of land with buildings in Charlestown at the corner of Medford and Elm streets, land which had been granted to Hatch and Hurd by Moses P. Worthen. The deed was co-signed by Hannah W. Hurd. The same lot was sold back for one hundred dollars, 27 June 1840, and that deed co-signed by Jacob and Sarah E. Hatch (Middlesex Deeds 403:306). On 8 Oct. 1841 Loammi Hurd mortgaged some land in Charlestown to his father James Hurd, both carpenters, for \$350. The mortgage was cancelled, 15 August 1845 (ibid., 408:351). Loammi then purchased from his father for \$1005.50 a "certain piece of land numbered Lot 6A7 on plan of Estates drawn by S. M. Felton, June 1844 on Pearl St., Charlestown." That deed was co-signed by Hannah Hurd (ibid., 481:4). Loammi also mortgaged part of this last-mentioned property to his father on 28 Jan. 1846 with the deed co-signed by his then wife Eliza (ibid., 495:513).

(VR), 15 Oct. 1835 ABIGAIL GAGE WEBSTER, who was born at Salem, Mass., 19 March 1809, and died at Cambridge, Mass., 19 March 1882, the daughter of Isaiah⁶ (Nathan⁵, Jonathan⁴, Nathan³, Stephen², John¹) and Abigail (Heath) Webster of Salem, N.H. Both are buried in Mt. Auburn Cemetery, Cambridge, Mass.

Amos Hurd was a wheelwright with his shop and home on Palmer Street, Cambridge, Mass., on the present site of the book annex of the Harvard Cooperative Society. He purchased a lot on Palmer Street from William L. Whitney for \$816, 26 July 1847 (Middlesex So. Deeds 510:361). This lot was extended by 320 square feet purchased from Daniel L. Brown, 10 Dec. 1857 (ibid., 800:156), and further extended through an additional purchase from Francis L. Chapman, 31 Aug. 1863 (ibid., 910:258). "A Card," dated 23 Jan. 1857 in a Cambridge newspaper notes: "Mr. A. D. Hurd, feeling grateful to his friends and citizens of Cambridge, for the valuable assistance rendered him since the destruction of his property by fire, would take this method to return his sincere thanks, and to acknowledge the benefits of their friendship. Being encouraged and sustained by the interest they have manifested in his welfare, he again enters into his former business, hoping to give perfect satisfaction to all who honor him with their patronage. A brick building having been erected for his accomodation his old customers will find him at his old place of business, where, thankful for their kindness in the past, he would respectfully solicit a renewal and continuance of their patronage."

He purchased a lot on Church Street, Cambridge, located behind the First Parish Church from the Church for \$2359 on 1 April 1869 (Middlesex Co. Deeds 1075:247). That lot was sold 19 April 1878 to William Black for \$3500 (ibid., 1472:243). Amos D. Hurd in his will, dated 14 June 1888, divided his estate among his three surviving children, Sarah E. Hodges, Abbie W. Hodges, and Edward A. Hurd, "because of the attention, care and assistance they have kindly rendered me in my old age," and excluded his grandson, Arthur Hurd. The estate inventory included land and buildings at No. 9 Palmer St., Cambridge, \$5,500; household furniture, \$53.35; machinery and tools in shop, \$20; and a piano, \$60 (Middlesex Probate, file 24473).

She married at Charlestown, Mass., 3 Jan. 1836 SOPHIA WHITNEY, who was born at Danville, Vt., 23 May 1818, and died at Stoneham, Mass., 3 April 1902, daughter of Solomon and Marjorie (Walker) Whitney. Both are buried in Lindenwood Cemetery, Stoneham.

William Hurd was a morocco dresser in Boston, manufacturing in Charlestown, Mass., when in 1846 he joined with John S. Barker in recruiting a company for the Mexican War, receiving a commission as a first lieutenant. Due to the later illness of Capt. Barker, Lieut. Hurd was breveted Captain and was in command of Black Fort at Monterey, Texas, for two months. Two divisions under Oeneral Lane and General Cushing were called down by General Winfield Scott to reenforce him at Vera Cruz. General Scott was in the City of Mexico and wanted the reenforcements to open communication for him with Vera Cruz, where supplies were obtained. Captain Hurd's company formed a part of these troops. They marched to the mouth of the Rio Grande, about two hundred miles, in eight days, and then went by vessel to Vera Cruz. From there they went to Mexico City, from which city brigades were sent out to different points. Capt. Hurd's company was stationed at Mixcoax about two and a half months, protecting the inhabitants against the guerillas. On 31 May 1848, they left for home and were mustered out at Cambridge, Mas., the latter part of July 1848. During this campaign, Captain Hurd used the flintlock rifle and powder horn that had been used by his father in the War of 1812, and his grandfather in the Revolution. They are now in the possession of the family of the late Harold C. Hurd, Jr., of Stoneham, Mass., Capt. Hurd's great-grandson. In October 1848, Captain Hurd transferred his leather business and residence to Stoneham, Mass. He served on the original Board of Trustees of the Stoneham Public Library from its beginning in 1859 for about 20 years. He was very active in the Masonic Lodge, Ancient and Honorable Artillery, the New England Association of Mexican War Veterans, Knights Templar of Melrose, Royal Arch Masons, etc.

"Nature had deprived young Hurd of two of the choicest of her gifts: The gifts of speech and hearing, but in spite of these great drawbacks, he became an educated and well-informed man. After completing his education in the best institutions in the country, he returned to his home and secured work in the shoe factories, and so his life for many years consisted of his daily labor and his intercourse with his family and acquaintances. His cheerful face and his courteous manner to all, were characteristic of his pure manhood, and many a person to whom he was wont to extend a pleasant smile and greeting will remember the kind heart and true politeness of William Hurd, Jr." (Stoneham Independent, 9 April 1898).

She married in King's Chapel, Bosotn, Mass., 27 March 1831 GRENVILLE TEMPLE7 WINTHROP, who was born at Boston, Mass., 23 March 1807, and died at Cambridge, Mass., 14 Sept. 1852, the son of Thomas Lindall6 (John5-4, Wait Still3, John2-1) and Elizabeth (Temple) Winthrop. Grenville Winthrop was a direct descendant of both Governor John Winthrop of Massachusetts and Governor John Winthrop of Connecticut.

Grenville Winthrop graduated from Columbia College in 1827, and three years later received his Master of Arts degree. Meanwhile he had studied law in New York, was a major on General Morton's staff and afterwards a lieutenant colonel in the New York State Artillery. Returning to Boston in 1828, he read law and associated himself with local military companies, soon becoming commanding officer, lieutenant-colonel of the Independent Company of Cadets, an elite company of infantry in the First Division of the State Militia. On 4 January 1832, Colonel Winthrop was ordered to perform escort duties for Governor Lincoln on the upcoming election day. After having escorted the Governor to a church service, Colonel Winthrop had his company repair to the basement room of the Exchange Coffee House to await the end of the service and

escape from the cold. Through various complications, the company was not back in time to escort the Governor from the church, and as a result Colonel Winthrop was arrested "for disobedience of orders and neglect of duty." He was court-martialied and reprimanded in orders. To show that the affair was purely the result of personal pique on the part of Governor Lincoln, Winthrop had the entire proceedings of the trial printed - "Trial by a Court Martial of Lieut. Col. Grenville Temple Winthrop, on Charges Preferred against Him by Adjutant Gen. William H. Sumner, in Pursurance of Orders from His Excellency Levi Lincoln, Governor of Massachusetts" (Boston, 1832). Public reaction seems to have been in Winthrop's favor as he was elected a member of the Common Council of Boston in 1832, 1833 and 1834, and in 1834 was also a representative from Boston in the State Legislature. In 1833 he was elected a member of the Ancient and Honorable Artillery, and in 1834 was chosen its captain. In 1835 he commanded the Independent Boston Fusileers, and for a number of years was brigadier general of the Suffolk Brigade ("the Boston Brigade") of the Militia. He later moved to Watertown, Mass., from where he served as representative in 1840.

After her husband's death, Mrs. Winthrop resided for many years in the Isle of Wight, England, with her son. Though an invalid, she occupied and diverted herself by collecting autographs. "It happened that during the earlier part of her residence in the Isle of Wight, at Cowes, not far from Osborne, she had the same physician who was in attendance to the young Prince Leopold (youngest son of Queen Victoria). The prince being desirous to obtain some American autographs for his own collection, many exchanges were made between him and Mrs. Winthrop through the intervention of their common physician. In this and other ways, a large number of foreign autographs were contributed to the collection, ancient as well as modern, from Royal and Imperial personnages, as well as from distinguished statesmen and authors. A large part of them are not mere signatures, but letters and documents of literary and historical interest, and in most cases, there is a portrait, engraved or photographed, of the writer." It was Mrs. Winthrop's wish that her collection should find a permanent place in the library of the Massachusetts Historical Society. Accordingly, in June 1879, shortly after her death, her collection was presented to the Society by her children." (Lawrence Shaw Mayo, *The Winthrop Family in America* [Boston, 1948], 309-14).

175. JOHN⁷ HEARD (George⁶, John⁵, Daniel⁴⁻³, Edmund², Luke¹) was born at Ipswich, Mass., 14 Sept. 1824, and died at his home, 53 Chestnut St., Boston, Mass., 20 Feb. 1894. He married at Philadelphia, Penna., 31 Jan. 1867 ALICE LEEDS, who was born at Utica, N.Y., 30 March 1846, and died at Ipswich, Mass., 2 Sept. 1917, daughter of Rev. George [D.D., Rector of St. Peter's Church, Philadelphia, and previously of St. Peter's Church, Salem, Mass.] and Caroline (Treadwell) Leeds. Both are buried in the family tomb, Old North Cemetery, Ipswich.

At the age of six, he was sent to school first at Mr. Greenleaf's school in Salem, and later at Andover Academy and the Wells School and English High School in Boston. In 1839, when he was thirteen, John Heard sailed aboard the ship *Argo* with his uncle Capt. Joseph Farley on a voyage to Cuba and Russia. At the age of seventeen, he went to China with his uncle Augustine in 1841. John Heard spent much time in China and in 1844 became a junior partner in the firm, then upon his uncle's retirement he became the head of the firm, "Augustine Heard & Co." During this period he became the first civilian to enter Japan -- when he accompanied the American minister to Yokohama in 1859, and the first foreigner admitted to the interior of China when he made a trial steamship run through rebel-held territory up the Yangtze to Nanking and Hankow in 1861. His experiences in China are thoroughly described in his manuscript autobiography among the Heard Collection at the Baker Library, Harvard University; a typescript copy is in the library of the Peabody Essex Museum in Salem. In 1861 he was appointed consul to China by the Russian and Portugese governments, for which he was later awarded the Order of St. Anne (Russia) and Order of the Holy Ghost (Portugal). Upon his own retirement from active business in 1862 he made the following statement: "I left the House

firmly established, rich, and second to none in China. Indeed, I doubt if many would not have called it the first." Uowever, in the early 1870s there were several claims against the first including a suit brought by Heinemann & Payson for alleged non-execution of orders which sought damages of \$80,000. The Heards won, but the other party appealed, and finally the case was compromised. More serious was Mr. Heard's discovery that P. L. Everett, the Boston agent, had misappropriated the firm's bills of exchange in an amount that eventually reached \$245,000. Heard tried for two years to keep things going, but finally, on 19 April 1875, the China House collapsed; the failure was for millions of dollars (Robert Lovett, "Over the Counter," *Business History Review* 35[1961]: 571). Within two years there was an attempt at a revival of the firm, but by the time the brothers had reached China, the second House had already collapsed. They resided in Boston and at the family mansion in Ipswich, of which he acquired full ownership by purchase from his brothers. He was a member of the Ancient and Honorable Artillery Company (1865), and the first Commodore of the Eastern Yacht Club. A memorial biography of him appears in *The New England Historical and Genealogical Register* 50(1896): 99.

During the next ten years, except for a return trip to the United States in 1851-52 for the benefit of his health, he was employed by his uncle Augustine Heard, head of the trading, banking and shipping firm of "Augustine Heard & Co.," one of the largest firms operating in China. He worked in the main office at Canton, which was moved to Hong Kong in 1856 at the outbreak of the second Anglo-Chinese war. As an agent of this firm he was said to have been the first Western businessman permitted to trade in Siam, this occurring in 1855. Later, Heard represented the firm in Europe, principally in England, France, Belgium and Russia. From the fact that it was said at the time that Mr. Heard's carriage and his wife's jewels were as fine as any in Paris, it would appear that he lived there on a grand scale.

Although "Augustine Heard & Co." failed, as did many other American houses doing business in the Far East during the period of 1870 to 1872, he spent a number of years in the Orient thereafter and during the period 1890 to 1894 was United States Minister to Korea, being appointed by President Benjamin Harrison. Mr. Heard was decorated with the Order of Leopold by King Leopold of Belgium. His later years were spent partly in Europe and partly in Washington, D.C. (*National Cyclopaedia of American Biography*, 28:327).

177. NATHAN⁷ HEARD [changed name to NATHAN FERDINAND HEARD by act of legislation, 1847] (Nathan⁶⁻⁵, Daniel⁴⁻³, Edmund², Luke¹) was born at Worcester, Mass., 13 Dec. 1823, and died there 9 March 1891. He married AMELIA SPURCK, who was born at Zanesville, Ohio, and died at Newton, Mass. (VR), 25 March 1910, aged 65 yrs., 4 mos., 12 days, daughter of William and Eliza A. (VanHorne) Spurck. Both are buried in the Rural Cemetery, Worcester.

"After receiving his education he went west and was in the employ of the Union Pacific Railroad several years. He returned to Worcester and has resided here since. Of late years Mr. Heard has been on court duty at the court-house when an extra officer was needed, and he served most of the time ex-Sheriff Sprague was in office. He was a constable and occasionally collected bills. Up to his last sickness he was a clerk at the Grove-street mill of the Washburn & Moen Manufacturing Company" (*Worcester Telegram*, 10 March 1891). His occupation was listed as laborer (1874), stationer (1876), and bookkeeper (1891).

The 1850 census listed him as a bookkeeper living in a boarding house in Roxbury, Mass. The 1880 census of Worcester, Mass., listed: Nathan F. Heard, 56, b Mass., collecting for Singer S.S. JOHN JAY⁷ HEARD (John⁶, Nathaniel⁵, Daniel⁴⁻³, Edmund², Luke¹) was born at Boston, Mass., 26 Feb. 1809, and died there at the Lunatic Asylum, having suffered from "mania" for four years (VR), 4 Oct. 1862. He married first 25 Aug. 1835 SARAH N. DYER, who died of consumption at Roxbury, Mass. (VR), 13 Aug. 1848, aged 39 years. He married second at Boston, 21 April 1853 FIDELIA REED, who was born at Easton, Mass., 13 Aug. 1823, and died at Boston, 22 Feb. 1895, daughter of Daniel⁶ (William⁵⁻⁴, Jacob³, William²⁻¹) and Sally (Wild) Reed.

John J. Heard was variously listed as "gentleman" (1840, 1844), mariner (1853) and harness-maker (1858). However, his major interest was the sea. While on a voyage to Australia and the East Indies in 1854 he discovered an island in the south Indian Ocean which now bears his name as Heard Island. The log-book of this voyage later was in the possession of Capt. Heard's great-grandson David B. Heard of Wareham, Mass. He resided at Northfield, Mass. (1858) and later in Roxbury. Fidelia Reed Heard was a Mayflower descendant through the Pilgrim Francis Cooke, and she is said to have founded the first kindergarten in the United States, this being in Boston.

JOHN TRULL⁷ HEARD (Robert⁶, Nathaniel⁵, Daniel⁴⁻³, Edmund², Luke¹) was born at Boston, Mass., 4 May 1809, baptized at the First Congregational Church of Ipswich (VR), 14 April 1816, and died at his residence in Boston, 4 Louisburg Square, 1 Dec. 1880. He married 17 Oct. 1832 [by Ralph Waldo Emerson, then pastor of the Second Church in Boston] ALMIRA PATTERSON, who was born 2 Dec. 1814, and died at their residence, 20 Louisburg Square, Boston, 2 April 1881, daughter of Deacon Enoch⁵ (David⁴, James³, Andrew², James¹) and Mary (Adams) Patterson of Boston (Temple, *History of Framingham, Mass.* [1887], 666); both buried Mt. Auburn Cemetery, Cambridge.

During his boyhood he attended the elementary schools in his neighborhood. His youthful days were mostly passed in the town of Ipswich, but he later attended the academy at Lexington, Mass. He there fitted to enter Harvard College, but preferring a mercantile career, instead of professional life, he commenced active business at the age of twenty-one years. In 1825 he entered the counting-room of his step-father, John W. Trull, devoted himself earnestly and closely to business and later became the principal partner in the house. Mr. Heard was later director of the North Bank in Boston, which position he soon resigned. He was the Democratic nominee for mayor of Boston in 1846 but was defeated by Josiah Quincy, Jr. "Upon the accession of Gen. Pierce to the presidency in 1853, the position of sub-treasurer of the United States at Boston was offered him, but it was declined. It was well understood that had Lewis Cass succeeded in the national election of 1848, Mr. Heard would have been appointed secretary of the treasury of the United States, a position tendered him by President Buchanan. He was on intimate terms with President Lincoln, and in 1864 presided over the celebrated meeting held in Faneuil Hall to further the re- election of that great magistrate" (Oliver Ayer Roberts, History of the Military Company of Massachusetts now called the Ancient and Honorable Artillery Company of Massachusetts, 1637-1888 [Boston, 1898], 3:283). He was also an unsuccessful candidate in the congressional race of 1858 for the 5th Massachusetts District, which was won by Anson Burlingham. During the period 1861 through 1865, Mr. Heard spent much time in Washington.

"In 1851 Mr. Heard was appointed on the staff of Gov. Boutwell, and from that appointment he acquired the title of colonel, by which he was generally recognized in after years... He was ... fond of participation in the management of public interests which were really for the general good. He was an early member of the Cochituate water board, of the board of trustees of the Boston Public Library, and a director of the homes of industry and reformation. While a resident of Washington, D.C., during the Rebellion, he was unremitting in his attentions and kind officers toward the soldiers of the Union, especially those in the hospitals. Mr. Heard was a prominent and active Freemason from 1845 until his decease, being elected 10 Dec. 1856, grand master of Masons in Massachusetts. In June 1857 he inaugurated with Masonic ceremonies a marble statue of Gen. Joseph Warren, in the presence of, and at the request of, the Bunker Hill Monument Association. On 2 Oct. 1858 he laid the cornerstone of Minot's Ledge Lighthouse and delivered an address; and in 1859 similarly laid the cornerstone of the monument erected in memory of the Pilgrim forefathers at Plymouth. On 27 Dec. 1859 he dedicated Freemasons' Hall

in the Winthrop House, corner of Tremont and Boylston streets, where the Masonic Temple now stands. He was an indefatigable worker, and his addresses, reports, and various historical and other papers which he prepared are a monument to the wonderful patience and exhaustless industry of Grand Master Heard. 'The dignity of his presence, and the grace and courtesy of his manners, lent an absolute charm to the performance of his high duties.'" (ibid., 282-3). He was a member of the Ancient and Honorable Artillery Company (1857), a life member of the New England Historic Genealogical Society, and he only American member (honorary) of the British Order of St. John of Jerusalem (1881).

John T. Heard Lodge, A.F. & A.M. in Ipswich, Mass., is named in his honor. There is a memorial biography of him in *The New England Historical and Genealogical Register* 36(1882): 353. A letterbook which he kept as grand master of the Masons from 1856 to 1857 is in the Peabody Essex Museum, Salem. A portrait of Mr. Heard by Edwin Tryon Billings is located at the Grand Lodge of Masons, Boston.

The Ipswich Antiquarian Papers, August 1880, noted that "Mr. John T. Heard of Boston has in his possession a Bible printed in 1599, brought from England by Luke Heard. Mr. Heard received the Bible from his grandfather Nathaniel Heard, who received it from his father who was a grandson of Luke." The Bible has not since been located.

After received her preliminary education in the public schools of Newburyport, Dr. Hurd-Mead was graduated M.D. at the Women's Medical College of Pennsylvania in 1888; she interned for a year at the New England Hospital for Women and Children, Boston, and later pursued special medical studies in Paris, Stockholm, Berlin and London during the period 1889 to 1890, Vienna in 1904, and London and Paris in 1921; she was appointed medical director of the Bryn Mawr School in Baltimore, Maryland, in 1890, and served as a physician at the Evening Dispensary for Women and Children, South Baltimore, while studying at Johns Hopkins University; following her marriage, she established a general medical practice in Middletown, Conn., specializing in diseases of women and children after 1910; she was an incorporator in 1895 of the Middlesex County Hospital in Middletown, and was consulting gynecologist from 1907 to 1925 as well as secretary of the institution and a lecturer in gynecology in its nurses' training school; after 1929 she resided in Haddam, Conn., where her practice was largely consultative; during the early years of her career, Dr. Hurd-Mead wrote many articles, chiefly on women's diseases, which were published in professional journals, and during World War I served in the Volunteer Medical Service Corps and wrote numerous articles on hygiene and public health for the Council of National Defense and other organizations; encouraged by her mentors at Johns Hopkins, she spent many years in research on the achievements of women in the medical profession; from 1924 to 1930 she made annual visits to the medical centers and libraries of Europe for this purpose and in 1938 published A History of Women in Medicine, which treated the subject from Egyptian times to the beginning of the 19th century. In addition to this project, Dr. Hurd-Mead was the author of A Short History of the Pioneer Medical Women of America and a Few of Their Colleagues in England (1933); she was active in the Child Welfare Association and the League of Women Voters; distinguished among women physicians for her professional achievements, she was named Deputy Manager of the Medical Women's International Congress held in Geneva in 1922, and was also a member of the International Medical Women's Association from 1922 to 1924, a fellow of the American Medical Association and a member of the American Association of University Women, American History of Science Society, Garden Club of America, Medical Women's Society of Connecticut (president, 1922-1925), Connecticut State and Middlesex County Medical societies, and the Monday Club of Middletown, Conn. (National Cyclopedia of American Biography, 38:490). Dr. Hurd-Mead's papers are in the Archives & Special Collections on Women in Medicine, Medical College of Pennsylvania & Hospital, Philadelphia (Notable American Women, 2:241-242).

In 1862 Sidney Bird was admitted to partnership in "The John Bird company," which was founded by his father. The firm, based in Rockland, Me., was engaged in wholesale and retail grocery business, and also active in ship-building, eventually developing one of the largest fleets in the area. In 1891, the company was incorporated with Sidney Bird as one of its directors; he later served as President of the firm, also as President of the North Bank, Rockland, organized by his father, whom he succeeded in this position. He was President of the Camden and Rockland Water Co., having been one of its foremost promoters prior to its formation. He also promoted the Rockland-Thomaston & Camden Street Railway, which served the three towns. Mr. Bird was a staunch and active Republican, serving three terms in the State Legislature and one on the Governor's Council, under Governor Powers. While on the Council, he became interested in a project for the construction of a mental hospital and later was appointed sole authority to continue an investigation as to the project's feasibility, which resulted in the construction of the Eastern Maine Hospital for the Insane, near Bangor, Maine.

Here, under the special charge of Elmer S. Bird, the firm began roasting its own coffees and producing its own extracts and spices. The name of 'Three Crow' brand was bestowed upon all the leading preparations; there was hardly a concern which did not handle the Three Crow brand. The spice mill was such a success that it was one of the prime causes which led to the erection of the new building on Sea Street." Their name changed to the Knox County Trust Company about 1933, and in the late 1950s was again changed to the Depositors Trust Co. Mr. Bird moved to Portland, Me., and opened an office for the sale of securities under his name. From there he went to Boston and acquired the assets of Bond & Goodwin, an old brokerage house.

Henry Bird began his career as a clerk with the John Bird Co., continuing in that position until 1905, when he and his brother Elmer purchased William H. Bird's interest in the firm. He became Vice-President, buyer and sales manager, holding these positions until 1917, when he resigned to form the Medomak Canning Company, at Winslow's Mills, Maine. The first products were blueberries, sweet corn, squash and mince meat. The business was expanded with the entry of Henry's sons, Theodore in 1931, and Frederic in 1938. In 1936 the properties of Twitchel-Champlain Co. at New Sharon and Mercer were purchased. Corn, string beans and squash were packed at this New Sharon plant, while the other facilities were dismantled. The New Sharon plant reached a

capacity of 600,000 cases per year, before it was destroyed by fire on 12 Nov. 1960. In 1940 Henry Bird retired, leaving the management to his sons. The registered name of the Medomak Canning Co. is "One Pie," and the majority of the company's products are packed under this label.

He was promoted to corporal on 1 March 1864, and on 6 May 1864 was wounded at the Battle of the Wilderness. Corp. Hurd, the company poet, was mustered out on 19 June 1864. The 1870 Cambridge City Directory listed him as a soap-maker of the firm Cooper & Hurd and as residing at 82 River Street, Cambridge. Subsequent directories listed him as a clerk at Fanueil Hall Square, Boston. At the time of his death he resided at 28 Howard Street. An obituary in a Cambridge newspaper noted that "he had considerable literary ability, but it was unfortunately brought out in such a modest way that few besides his relatives and most intimate friends were favored with his productions....

Possessing as he did the spirit and bearing of a true gentleman, he was a favorite with all who knew him. But far above all other attainments, was the firm and unshaken trust which he held in God as his Creator and his Saviour. When asked if he was afraid to die, he replied with the spirit of a Christian soldier, 'I have faced death for three years, and am not afraid to meet death now."

Arthur Hodges enlisted in the U.S. Engineer Corps, Co. C, on 18 Sept. 1861, and served in the Peninsular Campaign under Gen. McClellan; he was discharged, 8 Sept. 1862, to accept commission as first lieutenant in the 38th Mass. Vol. Infantry, being mustered 12 Sept. 1862. Lt. Hodges served with his regiment in Louisiana commanding his company in the Teche Campaign, and for gallant service in the fight at Bisland, 12 and 13 April 1863, was promoted to captain. He was at the siege of Port Hudson from May to July 1863; he was then detached and put in the engineer service and sent to the Department of the Gulf remaining in this service until the end of the war, and having charge of the reconstruction and improvement of fortifications of the Gulf Coast, principally at Fort Livingston, Louisiana, and Fort Pickens, Florida. He was mustered out as captain, 13 July 1865. After returning to civilian life, Mr. Hodges practiced his proession of engineering, making a speciality of electric street railways, in which branch he gained a reputation second to that of no other engineer in the country. He was for a time chief engineer of the West End Street Railway Company of Boston (Almon D. Hodges, *Genealogical Record of the Hodges Family of New England* [Boston, 1896]).

236. ABBY WEBSTER⁸ HURD (Amos⁷, James⁶⁻⁵, William⁴, Nathaniel³, Edmund², Luke¹) was born at Cambridge, Mass., 4 Oct. 1847, and died at Medford, Mass., 22 Dec. 1907. She married at Council Bluffs, Iowa, 11 Sept. 1877 GILBERT HODGES, who was born at Brookfield, Mass., 8 Dec. 1850, and died Feb. 1919, the son of Rev. Joseph⁷ (Joseph⁶⁻⁵⁻⁴⁻³, Henry², William¹) and Rosabella (Stockbridge) Hodges; both are buried in Mt. Auburn Cemetery, Cambridge, Mass. He married second Gladys Blanche ---, and had further issue.

When sixteen years old, Gilbert Hodges went before the mast and lived a sailor's life for four years. In 1870, in mid-winter, he was shipwrecked in the Atlantic Ocean, being rescued from the wreck on his twentieth birthday. In 1871 he entered his brother's office and studied civil engineering until 1874; then he went in to the wholesale paper and stationery business, holding a position with a large firm in Nebraska from 1876 to 1881. But his true vocation was engineering, and giving up trade in 1881, Mr. Hodges went into the service of the Union Pacific Railway and was employed in making surveys and locations in Colorado, Wyoming and Kansas. From 1882 to 1887, he was connected with the Boston and Lowell Railroad, in the engineering, bridge and building departments, as draughtsman, assistant engineer and assistant master of bridges and buildings. Having served a thorough apprenticeship in the different branches of his profession, in 1887, he opened business. Among other works, he had charge of the construction of the arch to replace the noted Bussey Bridge on the Boston and Providence Railroad. A large part of his time was devoted to electric railroads, in which line he was so successful that he counted among his clients upwards of forty different roads in various parts of the Atlantic states. The Hodges resided in Medford, Mass., from at least 1888 to 1904, primarily at 36 Grand View Avenue, and he later moved to Franklin, N.H. (Hodges, Genealogical Record of the Hodges Family of New England). He was a member of the Society of Mayflower Descendants as a descendant of John Alden through his paternal grandmother, Sally (Gilbert) Hodges.

The will of Abby Hodges left the bulk of her estate to her husband and among other bequests left family mementos to various relatives including to her sister Sarah Hodges, "the gold ring with my mother's hair in it given to me by my mother and marked on the inside 'From Mother'"; to her daughter, Evelyn Hodges, "three sterling silver tea-spoons marked 'W,' one sterling silver table-spoon marked 'A.G.W.,' and the set of pink child (said last-named three articles formerly belonging to my mother, Abbie G. Hurd)"; and to her son, Gilbert Hodges, Jr., "the large armchair that was presented to my father and mother by their children at the fortieth anniversary of their marriage... [and] the old fashioned clock belonging to my father" (Middlesex Probate, file 76715).

He re-enlisted as of Woburn, Mass., on 7 Sept. 1864 and was mustered the same day. He was transferred from the 2d Massachusetts Heavy Artillery to the 17th Massachusetts Infantry by an order dated Dec. 1864. He was discharged on 30 June 1865 at Greensboro, North Carolina. While he was serving this term, his three children all died during a scarlet fever outbreak. He had removed from Stoneham to Woburn, Mass., in 1862 or 1863. The 1868 Woburn city directory listed him as a shoemaker living on Elm Street, but the next year he was back in Stoneham listed as a shoemaker living on Colincote St. In 1874, the Stoneham directory listed him as a shoemaker living on Main Street, near Hancock Street. By 1877, he was a resident of Weare, N.H. In that year his wife, who was called "insane," killed their only surviving son and then hanged herself (William Little, *The* History of Weare, N.H., 1735-1888 [Lowell, Mass., 1888], 606). James Hurd remained in Weare a few years before moving to Lynn, Mass., where he was listed in the city directories as a shoemaker through 1880 and in 1882 as a laundry agent. After that he was associated first with the Atlantic Steam Laundry and later the Troy Laundry, both in Lynn. According to an obituary in the Stoneham Independent, failing health forced him to retire eight years before his death. He was a member of the West Lynn Lodge of Odd Fellows, and was survived by his widow, one sister and a brother.
